



**PARK CITY COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES
445 MARSAC AVENUE
PARK CITY, SUMMIT COUNTY, UTAH 84060**

July 27, 2018

The Council of Park City, Summit County, Utah, met in open meeting on July 27, 2018, at 2:00 p.m. in the City Council Chambers.

Mayor Pro Pro Tem Gerber opened the special meeting at 2:00 p.m. She excused Mayor Beerman and Council Member Worel.

II) PUBLIC INPUT (ANY MATTER OF CITY BUSINESS NOT SCHEDULED ON THE AGENDA)

Mayor Pro Pro Tem Gerber opened the meeting for those who wished to address the Council on items not on the agenda. No comments were given. Mayor Pro Pro Tem Gerber closed the public input portion of the meeting.

III) OLD BUSINESS

1. Consideration to Approve a Request Made by Park City Institute (dba Park City Performing Arts Foundation) to Move Six of the Big Stars Bright Nights Concert Dates (8/5, 8/11, 8/12, 8/16, 8/24 and 9/2) from Quinn's Junction to City Park:

Harrington reminded the Council of voting procedures in the case of Council member absences. Jenny Diersen, Special Events Manager, presented staff's recommendation to move the summer concert series to City Park. She stated response to the July 13 concert was positive, and public outreach was conducted door-to-door and through neighborhood meetings. She noted feedback from those meetings and email response to community outreach was included in the packet.

Diersen stated there were support and concerns from the community. She indicated the request was an opportunity to troubleshoot for future, longer-term events. Access for public safety and transportation was easier for staff at the City Park location and it was centrally located and a community gathering place.

Diersen explained concerns included the perception of exceeding event capacity in town, and neighborhood impacts to residents. She explained staff would mitigate concerns by issuing resident access passes, placing directions on VMS boards to offsite parking, and police placement at residential and busy intersections to assist with bus and residential traffic. She stated community collaboration was critical to executing this event, and spoke of the need for continued community collaboration. She asked that the Council defer operational planning for specific concerts to staff.

Council Member Joyce asked about conflicts with private events already scheduled in City Park. Diersen responded existing reservations were able to move to a preferred location or adjust their timing to allow for concerts and clean up.

Mayor Pro Pro Tem Gerber opened the meeting for public comment.

Tom Heard, Park City resident, stated there were too many events and activities. He was opposed to the increased traffic and people during this event. He asked the Council to make Park City more livable and less entertainment oriented.

Amy Roberts, Kimball Art Center, was supportive of the concerts at City Park. She requested the August 5th concert begin at 7:00 p.m. instead of 6:00 p.m.

Mo Hickey, Park City Institute, thanked Council and staff for their support for the new venue. He spoke to community partnerships, and hoped for continued partnerships.

Teri Orr, Park City Institute, thanked the Council and staff and highlighted the request to change the time for proposed concerts to begin at 7:00 p.m. due to low ticket sales and community feedback. She stated the traffic patterns were different from the concurrent Deer Valley concerts and would not conflict.

Peg Bodell, Old Town resident, appreciated the effort on behalf of the Council to support the Institute. She supported the pilot year of concerts in partnership with the

City. She supported the event at Park City Mountain Resort as a permanent venue. She was concerned about the later concert start time in Old Town. She asked that the noise, lights and crowds be mitigated quickly at 10:00 p.m. She was concerned about measuring noise and stated there was confusion about where to measure decibels from. She asked that staff be better educated to measure noise levels. She asked that the stage face Deer Valley Drive to mitigate noise. She stated Sullivan Road was used illegally to access units on other streets, and asked that staff not encourage extra access to that street.

She appreciated increased signage and barricades and expressed interest in discussing parking passes with Council at a future date. She was concerned about 'A' passes and access. She offered to take staff to lunch to talk about long term event solutions.

Mayor Pro Pro Tem Gerber closed the public input portion of the meeting.

Council Member Ware Peek reported she had heard Grace Potter's sound engineer was able to set the noise level for her concert in City Park and was louder than permitted. She asked if there was a way to control that.

Diersen clarified that staff responded to noise complaints by measuring the decibel level from the complainant's location. She explained that if the decibel level exceeded the ordinance, the applicant would be asked to lower the volume. She spoke to the sound engineers. Orr explained that the artist's noise engineers determined the quality of the sound and not the volume. Diersen stated Police carried noise meters at events and were trained to use them.

Diersen confirmed her recommendation to keep the concert start time at 6:00 p.m. due to a number of reasons, including wishing to stagger release of Deer Valley concerts on the same nights. She stated Police and Transportation Planning supported that decision.

Council Member Ware Peek asked about Deer Valley concerts on Arts Festival weekend. Diersen confirmed the Deer Valley concerts started at 7:00 p.m. on Friday and Saturday.

Council Member Henney wished to support the neighborhood with the 6:00 p.m. start time. He spoke to the idea of City Park becoming the permanent venue. He asked for staff's comments because he heard concerns in the community that these concerts were opening the door to a long term solution for Park City Institute's summer concerts.

Orr responded it was not the Institute's intention to remain at City Park, and their goal was to find an alternative venue for summer 2019.

Council Member Henney asked about summer camp pick up locations. Diersen responded access for parents to pick up from summer camp at City Park would be built into the operational plan.

Council Member Henney stated there was a parking problem on Park Avenue with bumper to bumper parking, and doubted cars belonged to residents or Main Street staff. He wondered why there was no permitted parking on Park Avenue and asked for a solution. He wished to discuss parking separately. Foster confirmed a majority Council interest in an in depth parking discussion on Park Avenue. The Council agreed.

Council Member Joyce agreed with Henney and stated his concern was the negative feedback from the adjacent neighborhood and addressing the concerns of Old Town residents. He was reluctant to support a 7:00 p.m. start time.

Council Member Henney noted he was surprised by the neighborhood's support for the event. They agreed the response was mostly split. Council Member Henney noted concerns were about parking and not the event, and felt separate discussions about parking, and a permanent venue for Park City Institute, would be a solution to the community's concerns.

Mayor Pro Pro Tem Gerber indicated she helped with community outreach on Sullivan Road, and expressed concern that constant events had lost their allure and made day-to-day life for residents difficult. Council Member Ware Peek was surprised by the feedback; she heard nostalgia for the recent past in Park City. She also heard feedback from residents in support of the event venue if the impacts were mitigated, and it convinced her to consider these events on a case-by-case basis. She asked how residential parking permitting would be handled.

Diersen responded residential mitigations would be customized to each concert night. Staff would also use it as an opportunity to research and test solutions to see what worked best. Council Member Ware Peek expressed concerns about the Institute's future as an important cultural institution. She was concerned about Deer Valley concert egress during Arts Festival weekend: congestion and parking with additional concerts during the weekend.

Diersen stated Park City Mountain Resort (PCMR) was looking at ways to assist with parking. She stressed the importance of City and Kimball Art Center staff partnerships, and mitigating the impacts to Old Town residents. Council Member Ware Peek reiterated the event was not new and already permitted for an outdoor concert - it was just a new venue.

Council Member Henney stated it was balance and there were good reasons to approve or deny. He stated the Council was not ignoring issues, but trying to balance them.

Council Member Peek appealed to the wider community to respect Old Town residents during these events.

Mayor Pro Pro Tem Gerber spoke about event fatigue. She asked what and who defined a compelling community event. She stated Park City took on many events and they put pressure on the community. She noted that concerts in the park used to be free and small and were relocated because they became too large. She felt staff could facilitate more events, but questioned if the Council should.

Council Member Joyce highlighted that the Council had recently discussed cutting back on events. He thought the low response rate during door-to-door public outreach was because residents were at work. He was not in support of repeating City Park concerts in summer of 2019.

The Council was supportive of a 6:00 p.m. concert start time.

Council Member Henney moved to approve a request made by Park City Institute (dba Park City Performing Arts Foundation) to move six of the Big Stars Bright Nights Concert Dates (8/5, 8/11, 8/12, 8/16, 8/24 and 9/2) from Quinn's Junction to City Park. Council Member Ware Peek seconded the motion.

RESULT: APPROVED

Dear Mayor and Park City Council Members,

Thank you for making time to consider this request to relocate the Big Stars Bright Nights venue to City Park.

I appreciate the fact that you had people going door to door in Old Town to distribute the public notice which gave great detail about the events and answered all of my questions. Also, it was helpful that other Park City events were identified which coincide at the same time. I believe that at several of these events, it gives visitors another reason to stay a bit later and enjoy Park City longer.

While I was not living in Park City when they used to be here, I have attended several of these concerts at Deer Valley, one at Quinn's Junction recently and also the Grace Potter concert in City Park.

I realize that my opinion is quite subjective, as I love outdoor concerts and I live adjacent to City Park. However, in review of my experiences at other venues, living on Park Avenue and used to the traffic going by my home at all hours of the day/night, and also thinking of the community that I live in, I do believe that City Park is an excellent location for residents and visitors alike. Here is the short list.

- Centrally located so that traffic/congestion is distributed nicely. Quinn's and Deer Valley were at dead end locations which create large traffic issues and require additional (I think) resources beyond what City Park would require
- A large population of concert goers can realistically walk, ride bikes or park at PCMR/High School and get to the concert
- A true neighborhood experience. I personally believe that as people are walking to/from the concert and neighbors are out on their patios, in their yards, etc, there is interaction and it creates a community feel that is Park City
- Due to the mountains to the West of City Park, The sun goes down sooner than at Quinn's, making for a more comfortable and scenic venue for all.

I appreciate you taking the time to listen to the feedback, consider the options and hopefully approve relocating the Big Stars Bright Nights concerts to City Park not only for the remainder of 2018, but into the foreseeable future.

One of the benefits I didn't mention during my many recent trips to microphones is the boost to Main St business. Main St was electric after the Grace Potter concert, with establishments from Prime up the Spur full of concertgoers. It was all too easy for them to hoof it up the hill or catch a bus to the transit center to continue their good time. I have to believe future shows will help boost dinner and drinks sales on the nights they happen, even if on a Monday.

Finally, it seems few people attended the community input sessions. During work hours for most, this indicates to me that there isn't strong opposition out there to this move. To the contrary, there are many positive

comments all over Facebook in support of this. The Park Record just published an article and, in the comments, Peter Kemp notes his wish for a time change. <https://www.parkrecord.com/news/big-stars-bright-nights-concert-series-may-return-to-city-park/>

I know Teri wishes for the concerts to all start at the same time for the simple sake of consistency, messaging and promotion. Without wishing to further complicate things, I'll second Peter's request. I agree it's nice to have things stretch into the night. After all, the series' name references "Bright Nights," and we can't really call it night if the sun is still up. But my real concern is PCI's financial picture this summer. Losing out on SLC and Heber Valley ticket sales because people worry they can't make a 6pm start time can't be helping matters.

Jenny and Jonathan mentioned they are inflexible on two particular dates on which there is also a DV concert. I remind you of the actual traffic situation around Grace Potter. It's not that it was lessened on major corridors. It's that it was pretty nonexistent. If you consider the DV acts those evenings in question and the timing, I truly don't believe this will create some sort of cluster (other than the ordinary one trying to get out of DV). And it will only require as many police as have been on. They ended up with EXTRA resources at Grace that they diverted. And still all was beyond smooth.

So let's swing for the fences here!!!! (I know no other way.) 7pm start times and all events back at City Park!!! Then the community wins, PCI wins, the Kimball wins and, most importantly, City Hall gets a warm and fuzzy win. As always, I am grateful for your time, your consideration, your responsiveness and your action. And once again, major thanks to Jenny and Jonathan for making this all happen so quickly and working SO hard to score these wins for all of us!

Good morning,

My fiancée and I attended Grace Potter at City Park and we love the idea of seeing that location utilized for concerts going forward. The biggest three reasons are as follows:

- 1) Ease of Access: Taking the bus is so easy to get to that location and it is central enough that if you need an uber on either end you can walk a few blocks away and not be fighting crowds.
- 2) Convenience to other Downtown offerings: It became a much more fun "night" because we were so close to Main St. We would be able to go downtown for a drink and some food beforehand and then do the same thing at the end of the night. It seems like this would be much better for businesses in the area. At Quinn's, I am afraid most people go to the concert and then go right back out of town.
- 3) The Community Dynamic: Relative to other concerts we have attended in Park City, the one at City Park had the greatest neighborhood feel. People in the audience interacted more like they would at a backyard barbecue than a concert. This seems like something that should be promoted.

Hello Council Members,

Thank you for your efforts to spread the word and engage the community to offer feedback on moving the Big Stars Bright Nights concerts to City Park.

I do not have an issue with moving the venue. However, I want to make sure that PCMC staff is diligent in thinking about all stakeholders that this move will effect. This includes families that participate in the Park City MARC Day Camp. As you are aware, the Day Camp utilizes the building in City Park. Thus, drop-off/pick-up is a significant issue for families and Day Camp staff.

For the regularly scheduled July 13 concert at City Park, an email was sent to parents on July 12 at 11:21 am informing families about the concert and the logistical issues with getting to and picking-up children.

Dear Parents:

This Friday there will be a Big Stars, Bright Nights concert in City Park from 6-9pm. They will begin set up much earlier in the day though, so pick up from camp is going to be a bit complicated. A map was included without a "key" as what symbols meant: lots of icons but no identification of what they mean, no arrows for traffic flow. In addition, it appears the map document was created on July 12 at 10:30 am. I do not fault the Day Camp staff as they were not given enough time to adequately communicate to parents of this issue.

Ultimately, the Day Camp pick-up was moved to the MARC building. This was a solution that worked well for parents.

I just ask that a plan that includes PC Day Camp families is considered and part of the conversation. Please do not make families an after thought in this discussion.

Dear esteemed Council members:

The 49th annual Kimball Arts Festival is an event designed to promote the Kimball Art Center's mission: To inspire and connect through art. It is in that spirit, we want to support other art organizations and their fundraising efforts, as they seek to inspire our community as well.

Kimball Art Center is supportive of the Park City Institute's desire to move its August 5th concert to City Park. However, we cannot support a start time prior to 7PM. The reasons are as follows:

1. Kimball Art Center has a contract with both Park City Mountain and Park City High School for use of their parking lots. As such, we provide liability insurance up to \$6 million and pay temporary employees to staff these lots. We also pay to provide tents, chairs, tables and have other hard costs.

Ultimately, we are not willing to be liable for another event's parking needs, nor are we willing to pay our parking staff to help direct traffic for another event. Should the concert begin at 6PM as Arts Fest ends, these employees will be divided between parking needs for both events, yet only the Kimball pays them and holds the liability.

2. Kimball Art Center is loyal to the artists and vendors who pay to reserve booths on Main Street. This relationship is dependent on our commitment to keep customers on Main Street until the end of the Festival, at 6PM on August 5th, and directly impacts our fundraising efforts.

This is because money generated from beer garden and concessions sales go directly to the Kimball Art Center. Sending people to a concert where they will have additional food and beverage options is not in our best financial interest. We cannot, in good faith, support an event starting at 6PM within walking distance from Main Street as we feel this will encourage attendees to leave the Festival spontaneously.

3. Kimball Art Center is concerned about the traffic impact of Art Fest attendees, artists, volunteers, and our staff trying to breakdown our event at the same time a new event is beginning. There are multiple safety and traffic flow concerns. People will be walking back to their vehicles at the resort while concert attendees are driving into town and looking for parking. As well, there are multiple back and forth trips to the Kimball Art Center from Main Street as we breakdown and need to have all items off the street no later than 11PM.

We hope you will consider these concerns in advance of Friday's vote and look forward to seeing you then.

Music is one of the great connectors in our society; one that transcends age, gender, race, socioeconomic status, etc. Music connects us to memories, to places, and to people. This past week I had the fortune of experiencing a Park City community moment that was made possible by the Park City Institute and city event planners and volunteers at the Grace Potter Concert in City Park. It was evident to me immediately that the location of the concert was a community connector and the "blessing in disguise" of the year since PCI had to move from Deer Valley. My wife, Erin, and I rode our bikes in with some friends, and passed a multitude of people on bikes and walking, all going to the concert. We talk about being a community, and we are, but that feeling gets harder and harder over time. We talk about being connected, but we sadly live in divisive times, even apparent with some of the road rage lately.
