The Council of Park City, Summit County, Utah, met in open meeting on February 2, 2023, at 3:00 p.m. in the City Council Chambers.

Council Member Gerber moved to close the meeting to discuss property at 3:03 p.m. Council Member Doilney seconded the motion.

**WORK SESSION**

**Transportation Planning Update:**

Julia Collins, Transportation Planning Manager, Robert Stewart UDOT Region Two Director via Zoom, Carl Miller, Summit County Regional Transportation Director, and Gabe Shields, Matt Neeley, John Robertson, Alex Roy, Hannah Pack, and Franklin Williams, Engineering and Transit Departments, were present for this item. Shields discussed the Snow Creek Walkability Feasibility Study, which studied a graded pedestrian crossing in the Snow Creek vicinity of SR248. He reviewed when this was presented last May, Council favored a tunnel somewhere in that area as well as at-grade improvements to the SR248/SR224 intersection. His team met with UDOT and they weren't interested in helping with the intersection project. Staff also pursued a public/private partnership to construct a tunnel with a development at the DoubleTree Hotel site and through discussions, staff determined they did not want to place a tunnel there and be connected to that project. They were currently putting out an RFP for a designer to put together designs and cost estimates. He proposed returning in the fall with the designs and cost estimates and getting Council direction.

Collins referred to the list of disruptive transportation ideas. She noted the ideas were futuristic and they gave the City tools for planning. She and her team grouped the list into five categories: Existing City Policy, Regional Support, Special Projects, Not Currently Pursuing, and Grant Projects. She noted UDOT would give the City and Summit County a grant to study the disruptors to see which would be best for the City. It would also study parking, identify park and ride locations, look at future transit needs, traffic, access, parking policies and parking technologies. Following the evaluation, recommendations would be made on parking solutions, along with implementation and funding strategies. They would then present performance recommendations and a marketing plan. The grant would be awarded in the spring and Summit County would be the lead.

Collins stated SR248 was a UDOT corridor and it was a priority for the City. She reviewed in 2009, \$10 million was provided by UDOT to the Statewide Transportation Improvement Program. They started an environmental analysis in 2018, but in July of 2019, the project stopped because the City determined the preferred alternative of a widening project didn't fit with the vision of the community. In 2021, UDOT approved a rehabilitation project including an upgraded westbound shoulder lane, crosswalks, and the Richardson Flat traffic signal. She recommended advancing two potential paths. First was a short-term approach of building up the eastbound shoulder of SR248 for bus usage. They would take space from the median and shift it to the shoulder. They would also look at ways to advance the shoulder for bus usage from the SR224/SR248 intersection to Wyatt Earp. The other concept was exploring all transit possibilities with a long-term corridor plan. Collins noted staff needed to act now since these projects would take many years.

Council Member Dickey asked how they would annualize the disruptive ideas. Collins stated the list was the foundation. Pack stated they would explore all the options to make sure any technology presented to the City would provide a benefit to the City and to those who lived here. Council Member Dickey asked if there was a five-year implementation plan for the disruptor ideas. Roy indicated Council Members Dickey and Rubell, along with the stakeholder group, could look at some things outside the box, and advance those ideas or technologies to an analysis level. Council Member Dickey asked if those ideas could be looked at independently and if staff could get them to an implementation plan. Roy agreed five or six ideas could be moved along for viability.

Council Member Toly asked if reverse signaling on SR248 could be considered. Collins indicated that was good for a long-term solution and it would be evaluated. They would look at one-way, reversible lanes. Council Member Toly thought the light at McPolin needed an arrow and thought it could be fixed relatively easily. She also thought it was important to understand the intersections and see what could be done to improve them. She noted the buses in Wasatch County were successful, but the ones from Salt Lake were not as successful, and asked what could be done to get those folks on the bus. Mayor Worel stated that was being looked at on a regional level.

Council Member Gerber asked if the parking assessment would look at existing parking in the City and County to see how it was currently used and how to use it more efficiently. Collins stated the goal was to look at the regional parking lots. She heard there was a local need for a parking assessment for street parking and commercial parking as well. She preferred to keep the studies separate. Council Member Gerber stated a park and ride study was done and it was decided Quinn's Junction was the best location. She asked if the study would start over again. Collins stated only three parcels were considered in the previous study because those parcels were owned by the City or UDOT. She thought the SR248 corridor had potential for remote parking solutions. The new study would look at what available parcels the City owned, the access, the needs of the City, etc.

Council Member Rubell referred to the proposed Snow Creek Tunnel and asked why the City was moving forward with the design since staff was currently working on the Bonanza Park Small Area Plan, which should inform where connections would make the most sense. The development on the corner of SR248/SR224 was being discussed as well. He asked if it would make sense to delay the project until the strategic plan was put in place. Shields indicated that if they waited, costs would increase. Council Member Rubell asserted a strategic plan was in the works and the project should see the optimal location determined by the plan. Robertson stated they were finalizing the costs in this phase and wouldn't be looking at full development with plans and specs. Staff would come back to Council to present options and get direction after the design was completed. This process would take six months and the Walkability Committee and Council supported this step.

Council Member Toly stated many new residents would be in the Homestake area, and she asked that the whole area needed to be evaluated. Robertson indicated a light would be placed at the Homestake intersection. The problem with the tunnel being located there was that half of the block was the cemetery, so in that sense the Snow Creek area was the best fit for the tunnel. Council Member Toly noted the traffic light would give people the opportunity to cross the street at that location.

Council Member Rubell didn't want to move forward on the tunnel design if we planned to use the strategic plan. He also thought the Transportation Demand Management (TDM) and Kearns strategies needed to be revisited by Council. He indicated the Richardson Flat and Silver bus lines had good numbers and looked forward to a Transit update. He supported the eastbound bus lane. He felt the microtransit numbers didn't look so good. He also asked to discuss the Parking strategy further. Neeley indicated that would all be discussed at the next meeting. Council Member Rubell favored the approach to the disruptive ideas list.

Council Member Gerber supported the eastbound shoulder project. She also supported the disruptive list and grants.

Council Member Dickey agreed with Council Members Gerber and Rubell. He asked what the objectives were for traffic and transportation. Park and ride lots were a trip capture strategy, and there were success factors like reducing traffic. He hoped to discuss it holistically to build a strategy before moving to projects. He thought Council could have a facilitated discussion with an expert to guide them. Council Member Toly agreed, and she hoped the facilitator would have a base guideline to define what they were doing. She supported the eastbound lane. She thought one-way streets would have to come all the way into Old Town. In looking at disruptors, it was important to know where the people were coming from. She wanted to know how many guests were driving to Park City and then they could think of solutions so visitors didn't get cars at the airport. Neeley asked what Council Member Toly wanted to see with the baseline. Council Member Toly stated it could be different times of the year, but Council received conflicting reports on traffic. Council Member Dickey stated the regional group had great numbers and Daenitz could present that at the retreat.

Council Member Doilney supported the eastbound shoulder and studying solutions for the long-term. He liked the proposal from the disruptor list and wanted the Council to come together and understand what the goal would be. He also heard walkability was a priority for the community. Studies had been performed and he supported planning the tunnel while the strategic plan was being completed. He noted bikes and ebikes were popular and he didn't think the tunnel project should be put on hold. He felt the small area plan would validate that decision.

Council Member Rubell stated it was risky to continue with the project because the longer the project was planned, the more it would be locked in. There was no information to determine how big of a risk we were taking. He hoped Council could get more detailed information before decisions were made. Council Member Doilney indicated information had been collected since 2006 that informed this decision. He felt there was a very low risk that a better location for the tunnel would be found. Council Member Toly asked what the difference in the timeline would be. McGrath stated she would discuss the small area plan at the next meeting, but the plan would not be completed for 10-12 months. She indicated there was a lot of previous work on the tunnel, which lowered the risk. Although it was optimal to do all projects at the same time, it was not realistic and the small area plan would assume the tunnel would be at this location. Collins added the community supported the project which lowered the risk as well. The Walkability Committee indicated the tunnel was their top priority. The majority of the Council members supported moving forward with the tunnel design. Council Member Rubell stated he was not opposed to moving forward with the project, only the timing of moving forward.

## COMMUNICATIONS AND DISCLOSURES FROM COUNCIL AND STAFF

### Council Questions and Comments:

Council Member Doilney stated he went to the Colorado Association of Ski Towns (CAST) meeting at Steamboat Springs. Council Member Toly announced upcoming events in town. Council Member Gerber thanked staff for their hard work to keep the town running during Sundance.

Council Member Rubell noted the last audit stated the City needed a Standards of Ethical Behavior Agreement for staff, City boards and commissions, and City programs. He indicated having that agreement would help the audit score and he requested a discussion on that. All the Council members agreed to have that discussion. Council Member Rubell also requested a discussion for Council's role in upholding the local and state code regarding people interfering with government administration. He stated there was state code concerning interfering with the administration of government and there had been behavior by some who were interfering. If that behavior was happening, he wanted it corrected before it undermined the function of government. All the Council members agreed to have that discussion.

Mayor Worel opened the meeting for any who wished to speak or submit comments on items not on the agenda.

Deb Rentfrow referred to the discussion on the Snow Creek Tunnel. She hoped there was something that could be done while the tunnel was being constructed. She suggested a HAWK signal at that location might help and it would be an opportunity to collect data from the signal. She noted there was a tunnel by Fresh Market, but skiers didn't use that tunnel and ran across the street. She looked forward to hearing the report on the Richardson Flat Park and Ride. She sent an email to Council on the parking situation and indicated the resorts needed to build more parking. She asked Council to listen to the special Planning Commission meeting on the last week of January regarding the Snow Park project at Alterra.

Mayor Worel closed the public input portion of the meeting.

#### VI. OLD BUSINESS

##### **1. Discuss the Potential Expansion of Recreational Capital Facilities Including the Summer Camp Building, Aquatics Facilities at PC MARC, and New Facilities at the Park City Sports Complex:**

Ken Fisher and Tate Shaw, Recreation Department, and Erik Daenitz, Assistant Budget Director, presented this item. Fisher reviewed the history of the recreation facilities. He indicated the Recreation Advisory Board (RAB), staff, and community members made up a steering committee to work on the master planning process and they focused on asset management, supporting community needs, and building new infrastructure. They proposed to expand and renovate the summer camp building and aquatics center as well as construct a sports complex at Quinn's Junction. A survey was distributed, and 1,134 responses were received. The construction of additional pickleball courts was a priority. He stated the sports complex would include indoor and outdoor pickleball courts, indoor space for trail users, parking stalls, a Nordic training area, a new ice sheet, improved trailhead access, and more. He also noted Council's highest priority from the mid-year retreat was to renovate the summer camp building. The board recommended the following priority if the projects could not be completed simultaneously: aquatics, summer camp building, and sports complex construction.

Fisher stated the summer camp building was in an ideal location since it was close to the fields, playground, and the library. He estimated the cost to renovate it would be \$13 million. The MARC pool needed to be replaced. When he looked at pickleball courts at the MARC, the space was too constrained, so they looked at a new facility at Quinn's Junction. There was a lot of property there and regional partnerships could be considered for different amenities. He recommended keeping the bubble at the MARC for the courts in the winter. The RAB recommended replacing both pools with one pool that would include lap lanes, zero entry water features, and youth features. He stated an additional fitness area could go where the current lap pool was. The aquatics project was estimated to cost \$6 million and the fitness expansion was estimated at \$8 million.

Regarding the sports complex, the proposed project cost for the first phase was \$9 million. A future phase would include a covered outdoor ice sheet, a bicycle pump track, the expansion of the existing maintenance building, and field lights on the stadium field, for a cost of \$7 million. The total for all the projects would be \$43 million.

Daenitz stated the City had funds to approve the full project list. He reviewed Council was supportive of potentially expanding the uses of the Additional Resort Sales Tax (ARST) revenue. He noted the project could also be funded with a General Obligation (GO) bond that would go to voters for approval. He indicated the current GO bond debt limit was 2% of the assessed value of the City and currently the City was at 1%. He did calculations of the tax increase for median priced homes. A \$35 million bond would equal a tax increase of \$148.88 per year for 20 years. A \$50 million bond would equal a tax increase of 212.69. For secondary homes, the tax increase would be \$270.69 and \$386.70 respectively. He reviewed the history of the City's GO debt service and stated the first bond was for walkability and the rest were for open space.

Council Member Gerber liked the concepts presented and asked if RAB could explore the use of aquatics and how it could be used year-round. Regarding the summer camp

building, she asked what opportunities there were to use it year-round. Fisher stated the summer camp building could also be used for childcare. Council Member Gerber asked that RAB study the specifications required for childcare. Fisher stated he was looking for direction so they could proceed with looking at design options to meet licensing requirements. He noted the summer camp was licensed by Utah Child Care Licensing. Council Member Rubell asked if the list was broken down into immediate requirements versus other wants.

Council Member Doilney asked if there were other existing recreation facilities that weren't included in the plan. Fisher stated a group came to a RAB meeting petitioning upgrades to the skate park. Council Member Rubell asked who would operate the facilities, to which Fisher stated City staff should operate the facilities to ensure the quality of the programs. Council Member Rubell asked if the City could staff the facilities, to which Fisher affirmed. Council Member Doilney thought the sports complex would be user friendly and low maintenance.

Council Member Toly requested winter aquatics. She asked if the seniors wanted to share half of the summer camp building and how it could be configured to scale down the project. Fisher stated the project would need to be opened and reexamined. Part of the project cost was a new playground, a splash pad, and the relocation of the basketball and volleyball courts. Council Member Toly asked if aquatics could be considered for the sports complex. Fisher stated the committee discussed expanding a playground, but they decided the focus would be on only a few features. Council Member Toly asked if the park bathrooms would be remodeled. Fisher stated the building would be leveled. Council Member Toly asked if there would be a coffee shop/snack bar with the MARC expansion. Fisher stated that was discussed, but the responsibility of a restaurant was a burden. Council Member Toly thought a coffee shop like the one at the library would be nice.

Council Member Dickey asked if other regional entities could contribute to the funding of the project. Fisher stated Basin Rec built trails and never asked the City for contributions. He would welcome contributions but hesitated to ask. Council Member Dickey thought there were entities that didn't have reciprocity that could be asked. He asked why some GO Bonds didn't pass. Fisher speculated why a previous GO bond didn't pass but noted times had changed. Council Member Dickey referred to the sports complex and asked if the drawings were detailed or could configurations be changed, to which Fisher affirmed they could change. The National Ability Center (NAC) had concerns with the noise from outdoor pickleball courts because half of their patrons suffered from Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD). Council Member Dickey asked if usage was high at the Creekside bicycle pump track that necessitated an additional one. Shaw stated they were trying to show what could be placed at the complex because of how the pump track scored on the survey.

Council Member Dickey asked if the ice condition on the outdoor ice sheet could be maintained. Angevine stated the current outdoor sheets were well used. The problem was constant snow removal. Although the sheets were being used, it didn't meet the needs of the skaters and staff couldn't program classes because it wasn't covered and climate controlled. The proposal included a covered refrigerated ice sheet. She also noted it could be used in the summer for various activities. Council Member Dickey asked if the permanent structure at the MARC bubble would be for view obstruction. Fisher stated the property line was close to the neighbors and it would need a high wall.

Council Member Rubell asked if thought had been given to building a satellite gym at the sports complex. Fisher knew there was demand for it. As they got to the next level of the project, they could assess that. Council Member Rubell asked about expected revenue that would result from the project. Fisher stated historically the City didn't try to recover the cost from capital projects but tried to get 70% cost recovery for operating expenses. He expected pickleball would be at least as profitable as tennis and tennis recovery was 120%. Fitness had \$800,000 in revenue last year.

Mayor Worel opened the item for public input.

Luca Mishurda asked for an additional ice sheet. Park City was known for developing world class athletes. There were 70+ skaters on one ice sheet so safety was a concern. She hoped the City could help the skaters' dreams come true.

Michael Kaplan was with Shellene Vetterli and reviewed that 20 years ago, he sat on an ice rink committee. The facility was well used with many groups using it. It was a key amenity for the community. He requested a second outdoor rink that included a roof and that was attached to the current facility.

Tracy Meier, NAC Program Director, stated she worked there for 20 years. They loved recreation and thought it was life changing. She reviewed the potential new sports complex. She hoped thought would be given for safety for walkers and bikers, more restrooms, and noise considerations. She wanted the entire community to have a voice in the development.

Dr. Steve Allen, Veterans' Administration PTSD Coordinator, stated NAC was a partner with the VA and provided many services for veterans. Many PTSD individuals used the facilities and had sensitivities to repetitive noise. He asked to consider veterans when the outdoor courts were considered.

Miche White via Zoom stated NAC had been a peaceful facility for the last 20 years. She supported the indoor pickleball courts but the outdoor courts would disturb the patrons of NAC.

Ed Parigian, RAB Chairman via Zoom, stated RAB put a lot of work into the master plan. He thought the proposal aligned with the City's vision. He emphasized the need for the aquatics replacement. He thought the summer camp building was also needed. He spent a lot of time working on the sports complex and asserted that would be a great community asset. He appreciated the concerns from the NAC and noted there were some noise mitigations for the outdoor pickleball courts.

Joe Plomin, Pickleball Club President, indicated he was part of the master planning committee. He thought the plan was well thought out. He noted the survey results showed pickleball was the top priority for Park City recreation. He submitted a petition from the Pickleball Club members in support of pickleball facilities. He requested the master plan be approved. He also submitted an eComment which is attached to this document.

Gene DeSantis commended everyone for the work done on the sports complex. He indicated this facility wouldn't be available for several years. He thought something needed to be done to mitigate the deficiency in the meantime. Mayor Worel asked DeSantis to keep his remarks to the facility discussion. DeSantis also submitted an eComment which is attached to this document.

Elaine Murray stated she was on the subcommittee for court expansion and was part of the Pickleball Club. In the last year, she met more people playing pickleball than she did from having her kids in the school district. She recommended growing the sports complex because the sport was growing. They were losing people who went to the valley to play the sport. The bond would take too long. She thought if the City had the money, the facility could be built quicker.

Danny Glasser expressed concern for the noise element of the outdoor courts when that distressed the PTSD and neurodiverse community. He advocated to protect their interests.

Kathy was part of the Pickleball Club and she worked at the NAC. She thought the City was behind in pickleball facility development. She agreed pickleball courts could be a hazard for some at NAC, but it would be a benefit to others there. She started a wheelchair tennis program in California. She thought the community needed the sports complex.

Scott Schulman, Bridge 21, stated Bridge 21 was for the neurodiverse population. Many participants were involved in NAC programs. He was not opposed to the pickleball courts but requested an environmental impact study to make sure it wouldn't adversely affect the NAC participants.

Larry Cohen stated pickleball was huge but the City needed to catch up. He stated pickleball did well when there were many courts put together. Indoor pickleball was for kids to seniors and he requested to build it right and big enough.

Ian Hartley via Zoom stated he worked for Mountain Trails Foundation and supported trails at the sports complex. He stated if the complex was built, they wouldn't be able to drive the Snowcat to Round Valley. He requested that be taken into consideration when planning the facility.

Liz Stephen, Park City Ski and Snowboard team, via Zoom, stated they would love to have a warming facility and supported that recommendation.

Tuck Lowe proposed a dedicated space for curling. There were 50 in the Curling Club who competed with each other. They also hosted Learn to Curl events. He stated if he had dedicated ice, they could increase their events for corporate events, school groups, etc.

Susan Deniero via Zoom proposed Park City build year-round indoor aquatics at Quinn's and put the pickleball courts at the MARC.

Tim LePage shared his hope to achieve the sports complex alongside the NAC where both parties would be happy. He noted with increased pickleball, there would be increased revenue. He requested the master plan be approved.

Emma Garrard RAB member via Zoom, stated Park City Ski and Snowboard gave a lot of support for a warming hut at the trailhead. There was great success getting kids on skis at Round Valley and it would be a great benefit to have that warming facility.

Lita Hoffmann appreciated the work going into this plan. She noted pickleball was one of the fastest growing sports in the nation. She thought the City had to catch up in offering facilities for the sport. She hoped to have a plan that the NAC could support.

Mayor Worel closed the public input.

Council Member Doilney supported the plan. He thought the existing infrastructure needed to be addressed soon. He stated there were perspectives regarding the NAC that needed to be considered. The summer camp building could be a multipurpose facility and he wanted to move forward with the next step.

Council Member Toly stated there was a great potential to help families over the summer with the expansion of this building. She was in favor of the project but didn't want to use the full ARST funds on this.

Council Member Dickey supported the project but wanted the NAC concerns addressed. He also wanted to look at the Quinn's property for affordable housing. He preferred putting a GO Bond on the ballot for approval. He agreed with the prioritization.

Council Member Gerber indicated the City needed recreation, affordable housing, arts and culture and many other things. The City had a lot of issues and tradeoffs needed to be made. It would be great to have the facilities, but she wanted the community to remember housing and affordability were crises. She wanted to look at all the needs at once during the budget process. She supported the aquatics and summer camp building. When ice sheets and the sports complex were discussed, she didn't know if a bond made sense, since the residents would carry the burden that people in other areas would use.

Council Member Rubell was concerned about maintaining high quality facilities after they were built. The NAC concern was valid and the City needed to make sure this was done right. There were many solutions and he knew it could be worked out. He didn't support expanding the MARC for traffic reasons. He liked dedicated ice for curling. He wanted the committee to look at the entire recreation portfolio to see about staffing versus contracting and to be consistent. He would prioritize the summer camp building and then have a GO bond for the other projects as well as trying to capture regional funding.

Mayor Worel commended staff for the inclusivity of the committee and community outreach. Fisher stated an RFP needed to be issued for design through construction and stated that was the most efficient way to move the project along. At any point, they would be able to stop if directed by Council and they wouldn't have to pay for the remainder of the project.

Council Member Doilney thought there might be a way to expedite one of the three projects and he supported the RFP. Council Member Toly supported the RFP. Council Member Dickey supported it as well and asked how realistic it would be to have a GO Bond on the ballot in November. Council Member Gerber favored moving forward but asked if a GO bond could go for other needs beyond recreation. Council Member Rubell supported moving forward as long as the bond was on the November ballot. Council Member Dickey noted there was a nominal fund balance for the park building but \$4 million allocated in a future budget, although the funds were not existing.

Fisher read a prepared statement regarding pickleball user complaints on the lack of court time. He reviewed the direction given the Recreation Department by the Council and the adjustments made to accommodate the sport. He asked Council if they wanted to give more pickleball time in the bubble and noted it would impact tennis. Council Member Rubell supported switching hours around one or two days a week to give pickleball more prime time. Council Member Gerber supported the professional decisions made by staff and RAB. Council Member Dickey agreed with Council Member

Rubell on giving pickleball some prime time, but he wanted staff to look at that. He thought the two sports could coexist in the bubble but wanted to meet with Fisher. Council Member Toly preferred having this as an agenda item at the next meeting. Council Member Doilney stated pickleball court time was not an equality issue as reported in the newspaper. He supported staff recommendations. Matt Dias, City Manager, stated he and other staff members met with pickleball supporters to address concerns. He heard the adjustments being made and he advised staff to continue looking at adjustments to accommodate pickleball play time until new courts could be constructed.

## **2. Review the Lower Park Avenue Improvement Project Public Engagement Process:**

Gabe Shields, Transportation Engineer, indicated this project would go along Park Avenue from Empire to Heber. He indicated mobility had changed over the years and he wanted to look at what would work best for the neighborhood and community.

Duke Richardson, Avenue Consultants, reviewed the outreach goals: provide broad outreach to engage as many stakeholders as possible; check in on the community's opinion of the previous pilot program; determine priorities of the community for this part of Park Avenue; develop the ideal vision and goals based on public feedback; and provide the future design team direction on the desired roadway configuration. They had already distributed a survey, had open houses, held a stakeholder workshop and organized a technical advisory committee. He reviewed the survey responses. The community valued access and amenities. The conclusions from the survey were that buses, vehicles and bicycles consistently used the street, the pilot program was a success, the planter boxes were liked, and parking was not the priority for the community, but it was important for the stakeholder group.

Alex Roy, Senior Transportation Planner, stated the takeaways from the outreach were the vision and goals for the street. They heard they wanted pedestrian and cyclist safety. Parking would still be an element but not a priority. Shields stated final design would be worked on and then construction would begin next year.

Council Member Rubell thought it would be interesting to see the chart from Park Avenue residents from the other demographics, such as the workforce. He thought parking might be more of a concern. Council Member Gerber thought it was great to see the community adjust as the pilot program was implemented. She thanked them for the work done to get input from the community. Mayor Worel indicated the senior center project would be simultaneous with the Park Avenue construction. Shields stated there would be coordination to ensure no conflicts arose.

Mayor Worel opened the public input.

Bill Ciraco stated people who didn't live on that street often used the street to go to Main Street. Many parked at the library or City Park, and he asked that attention be given to walkability.

Ed Parigian via Zoom asked staff to consider making the speed limit 20 mph from the library to Heber.

Mayor Worel closed the public input.

## VII. NEW BUSINESS

### **1. Consideration to Approve Three Easements to Rocky Mountain Power for Transmission Lines and Underground Distribution Lines Across City Property:**

Luke Henry, Assistant City Attorney, and Dave Gustafson, Project Manager, presented this item. Gustafson reviewed the proposed changes in the transmission line alignment. One change would be on Holiday Ranch Loop Road and he indicated the change was needed to keep the distribution line appropriately distanced from the well head at Creekside Park. Another change was moving the line to go from the substation to the back of Munchkin. The other line would go over the cemetery to the bottom of Boot Hill and join the transmission line. This configuration would replace five poles, including one in the cemetery. Gustafson noted they could not get an easement for a line on Woodbine, which affected the Yard and the Emporium, because the owner would not allow the lines overhead.

Council Member Rubell asked if the City got an estimate to put the lines underground. Gustafson stated the transmission lines were not underground but the distribution lines were being put underground. Council Member Rubell asked if there was an incremental cost option to underground the transmission lines. Gustafson stated he received a quote some time ago, but it was cost prohibitive. The current substation only accepted overhead lines, so a new substation would have to be built for underground transmission lines. Council Member Rubell noted the substation would be discussed as part of the small area plan.

Mayor Worel opened the public input.

Chris Wilder, Rocky Mountain Power (RMP) Project Manager, stated he was online to answer any questions.

Mark Fisher stated he was the property owner that would potentially be affected by this issue. He thought his property would be devalued by \$2 million-\$4 million if this easement was approved, and he was only offered \$46,000 by RMP. He thought RMP would save \$18 million by cutting across the corner with the lines and the City's property would double in value once those lines were moved. He would like to enter into

mediation to work through the issue. He asked to work with the City and RMP to come to a resolution.

Mayor Worel closed the public input.

Council Member Rubell had an issue with sandwiching a property owner without the property owner working out their own deal. He also wanted to address the substation issue before a decision was made.

Council Member Rubell moved to continue the item to a date uncertain to figure out the big picture, and if this was the right answer in the interim or permanently.

Council Member Doilney asked if RMP installation was imminent because continuing the item to a date uncertain might be a problem. He asked if this item could be continued without affecting the current work. Gustafson stated they stopped work on the transmission line poles but continued the underground distribution line work. There would be a cost associated with this late decision. Council Member Doilney asked if there was a cost associated with continuing this item for one month. He wanted to verify this would affect Fisher in the amount of \$4 million. Wilder stated he had another project starting now, so this project could not restart until April 15<sup>th</sup> at the earliest. He also needed to wait until then so the ski resorts weren't impacted. The project would be six to eight weeks of work. Dias recommended continuing the item to March 9<sup>th</sup>.

Council Member Rubell withdrew his motion.

Council Member Rubell moved to continue the approval of three easements to Rocky Mountain Power for transmission lines and underground distribution lines across City Property to March 9, 2023. Council Member Doilney seconded the motion.

Council Member Dickey asked to bring back a cost estimate to bury the distribution lines and build a new substation. Luke Cartin stated the lines were already going underground. Council Member Rubell asked for an estimate to underground the transmission lines from Pole Two going left and turn on the dirt road on the other side of the cemetery. Cartin stated he would get the price for underground transmission lines and the associated problems with the new route.

**RESULT: CONTINUED TO MARCH 9, 2023**

Dias noted Mr. Fisher requested a meeting with someone from Council and RMP. Council Member Rubell indicated he would be the representative.

**2. 2023 Legislative Session Update:**

Matt Dias, City Manager, summarized the Legislative Session to this point. Many bills had been watered down. He distributed a tracking sheet and noted Michelle Downard updated the sheet regularly and it could be found online. He reviewed some bills of interest. The Legislature was trying to regulate sidewalk and road width to make subdivision approvals faster. There were many modifications for xeriscaping, including driplines. There was a target on cities holding a landscape bond. Golf course regulations had been proposed. There were many bills on noticing public meetings as well as bid noticing. He indicated a lot of work continued to be done on the Housing and Transit Reinvestment Zone (HTRZ) in Kimball Junction and the City was trying to help Summit County with that. Short-term rentals continued to be a topic, but Dias didn't think the proposed legislation would be effective for the City. It included language for jurisdictions to give amnesty to short-term rentals. Dias stated the City was taking a neutral position since it didn't move the City backwards. He did not know if the law would work for Park City.

Regarding the short-term rental bill, Council Member Doilney stated the amnesty pilot program could build and then it could become standard language, and he thought future councils should be cautious. He asked them to define 80% of residential areas. Dias expected additional discussion with regard to working on the language.

Council Member Toly asked about the Wildland Fire bill. Dias didn't know much about the bill, but he expected the Legislature to allocate surplus funds for wildfire mitigation.

Council Member Rubell asked for more info on SB 105 Traffic Enforcement, SB125 Electrification of Transportation Infrastructure, and HB136 Safe School Routes. Dias discussed fractional ownership and stated there would be some type of legislation on this, but he didn't have the details.

Board Member Gerber moved to authorize the Mayor to execute a memorandum of agreement, in a form approved by the City Attorney, to continue leasing surplus water to Weber Basin concurrent with the Western Summit County Project Master Agreement. Board Member Toly seconded the motion.

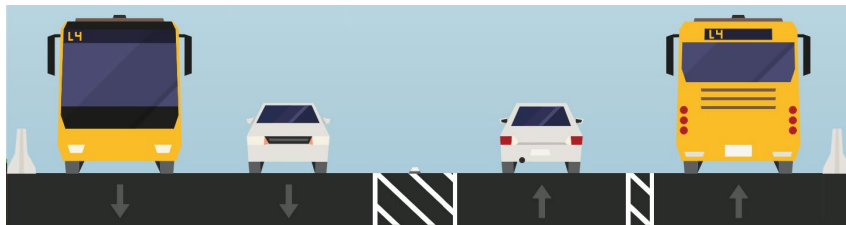

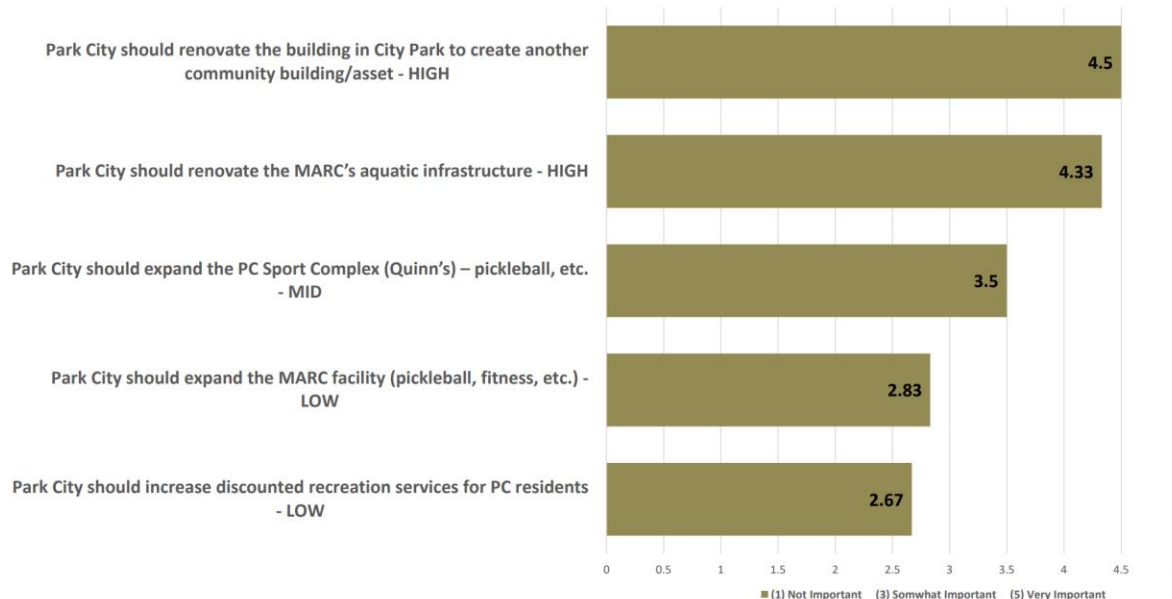
- Total of 1,134 responses: 84060 = 40%, 84098 = 46%, Other = 14%
- 66% of respondents agree that dedicated indoor pickleball courts are a priority, with additional group fitness and enhanced cardio equipment space needed to support the PC MARC
- Additional program improvements requested for the PC MARC include enhanced aquatics, enhanced tennis, and improved strength training facilities
- The most sought-after improvements for the PCSC were indoor pickleball courts (25.3%), enhanced year-round trail use (14.5%), formal cross-country ski area (13.7%), and outdoor ice skating (9.4%); and
- Additional improvements at the PCSC, including a bike pump park, visitor/guest parking, sport field improvements, and a warming hut.

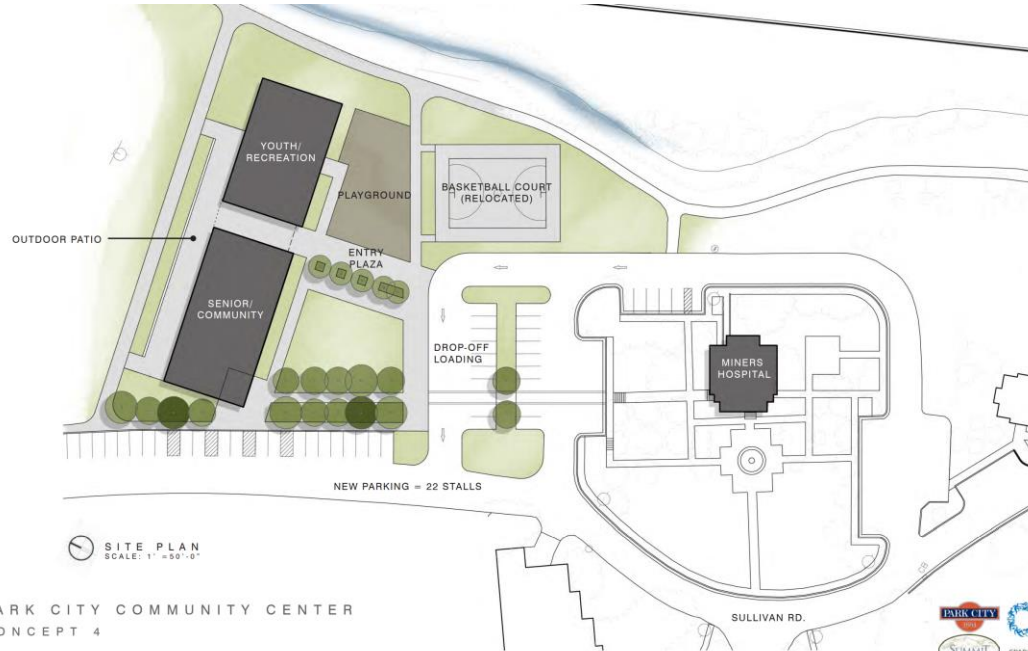

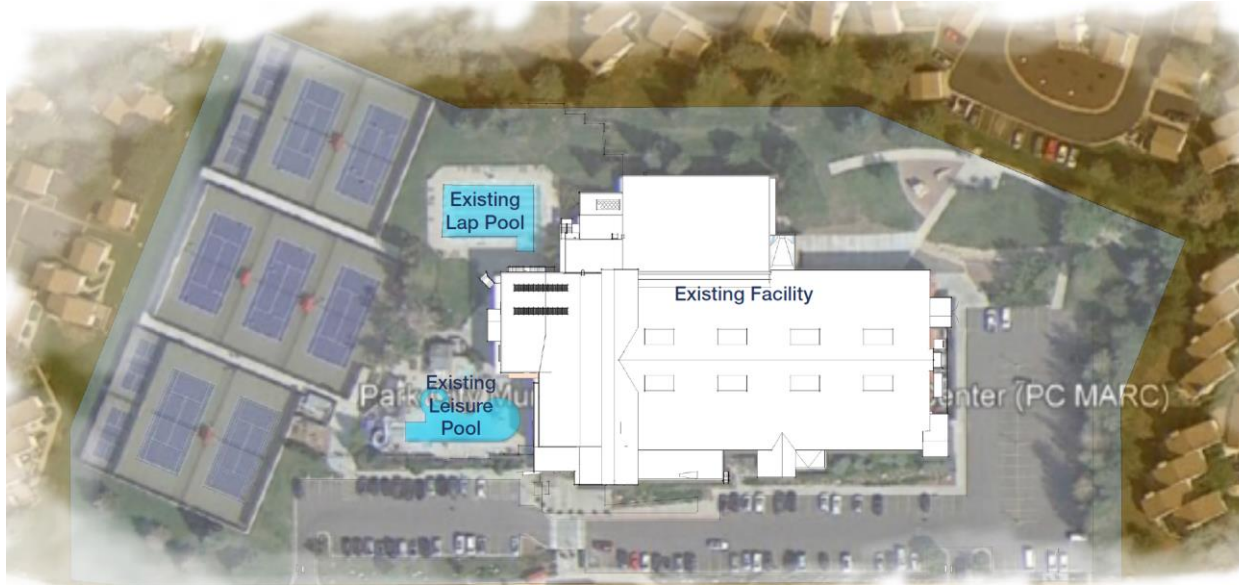

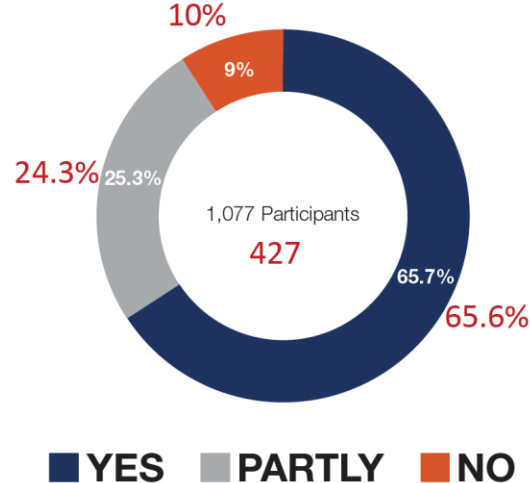

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# PC MARC

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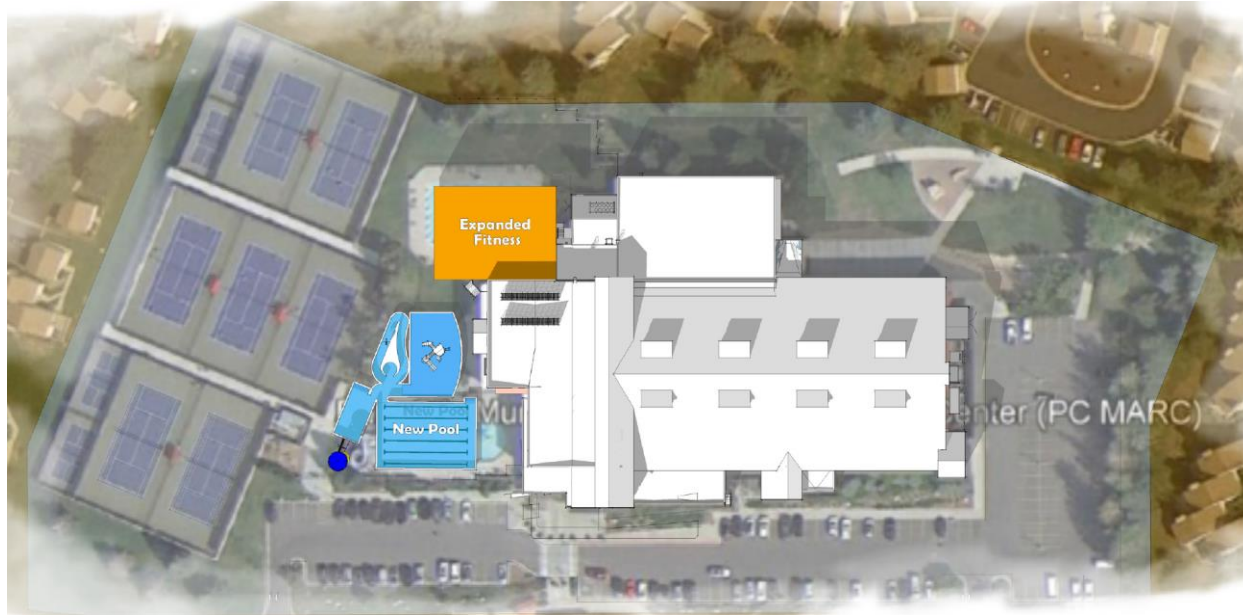
- Originally, we sought to add indoor pickleball courts at the PC MARC. After looking at space constraints and parking at the PC MARC, the Steering Committee recommends a standalone facility at the PCSC instead.
- A new facility at the PCSC can be built in a location that reduces impacts on abutting residential neighborhoods, accommodates future growth, and creates an opportunity for continued regional and public/private partnerships.
- After careful consideration, the recommendation is to continue the use of our air-supported structure for seasonal indoor court usage. Building a permanent structure (~\$4M) over the existing courts would require several variances from the Planning Commission in a residential neighborhood.

# PC MARC Aquatics

- Upon completion of the pool assessments, the aquatics facilities are recommended to be replaced soon. Aging infrastructure has caused equipment breakdown, lack of sustainability measures, and wear and tear have rendered the pools and spa no longer able to meet the PC MARC's standard of quality.
- The Committee recommends replacing both outdoor pools and creating one large body of water that includes recreational and competitive lap lanes, zero-entry water features, and youth and teen activity elements for open swim, learn-to-swim programs, and more.
- By combining two pools into one, a more efficient operations can be achieved by mechanical and filtration systems. One body of water also reduces the number of lifeguards required to meet state regulations.

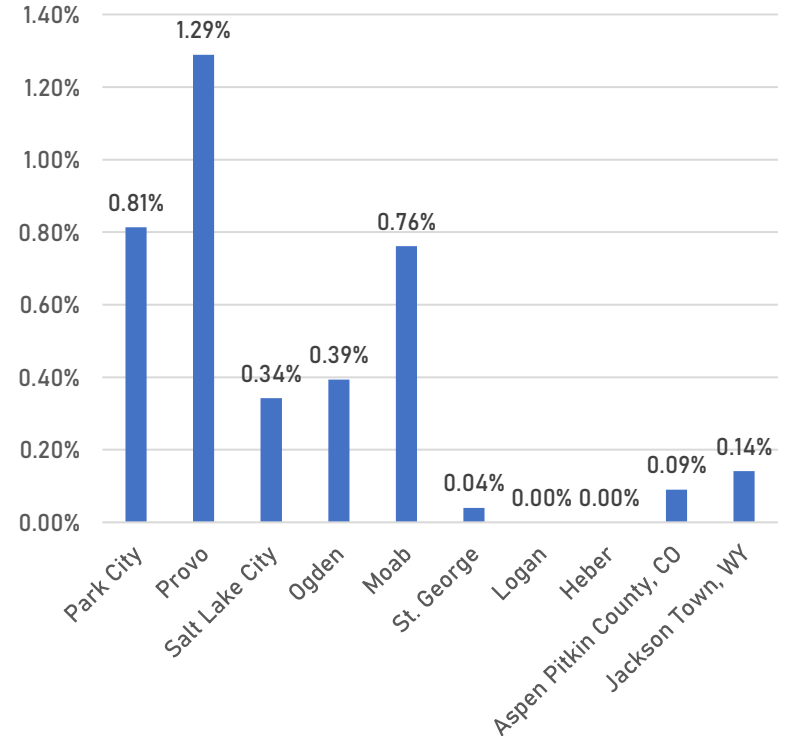

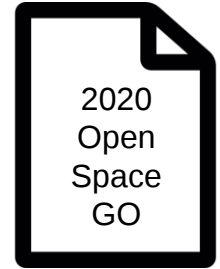

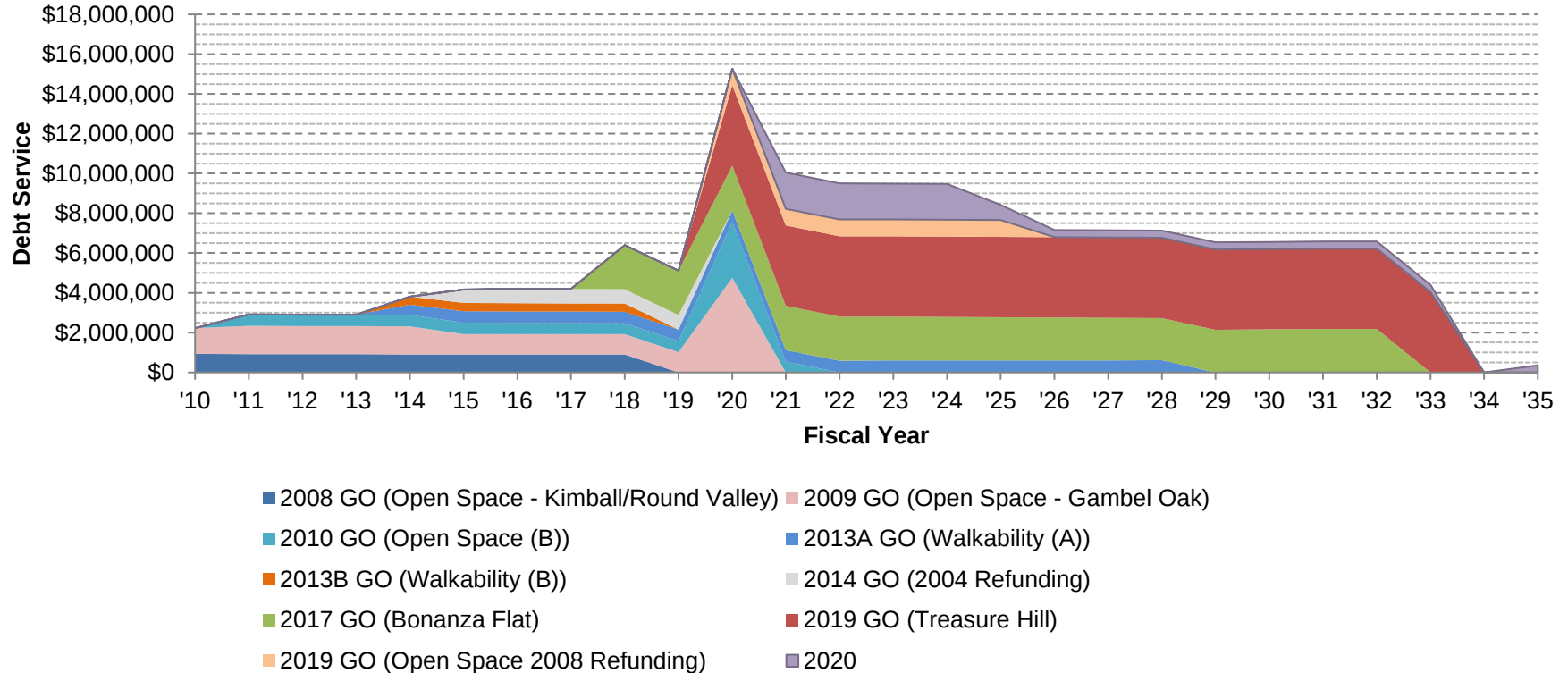

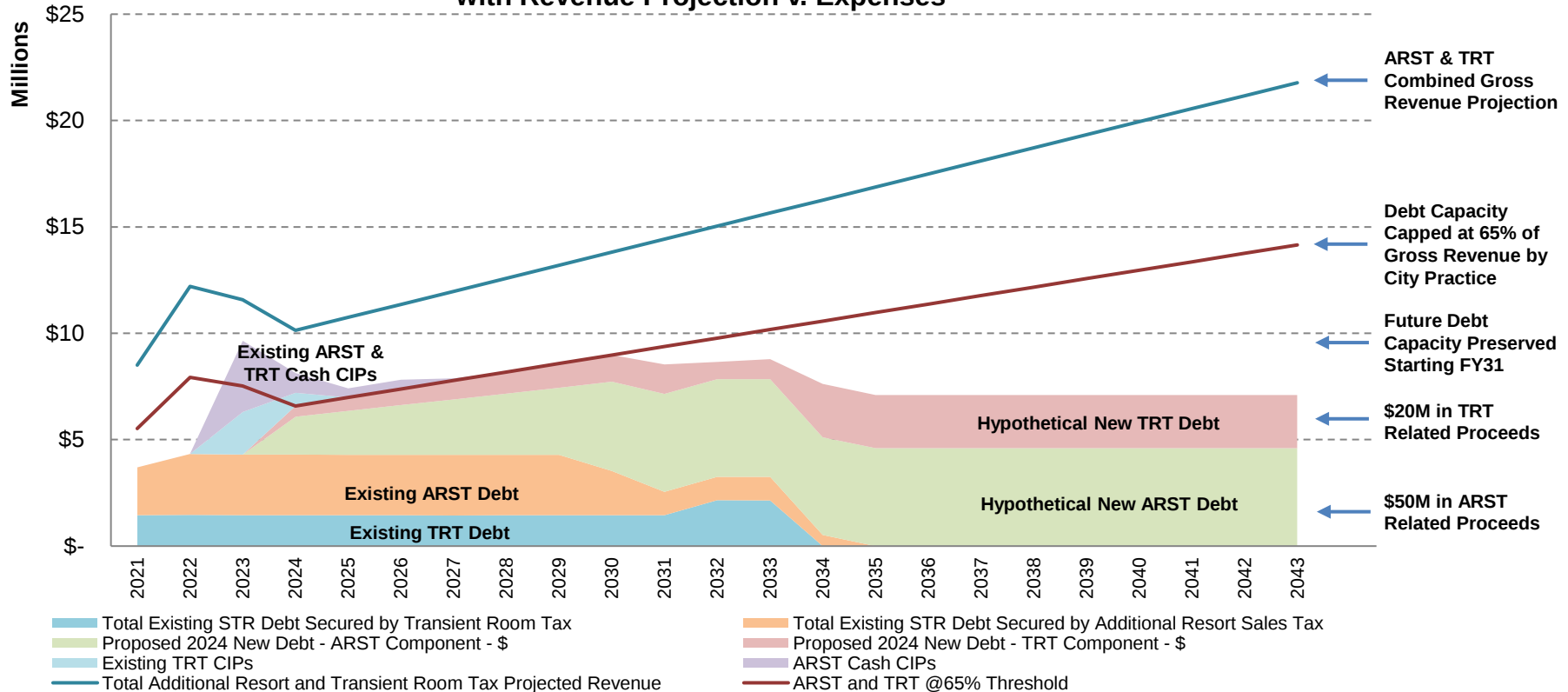

## ARST & TRT Combined Hypothetical Debt Structure with Revenue Projection v. Expenses



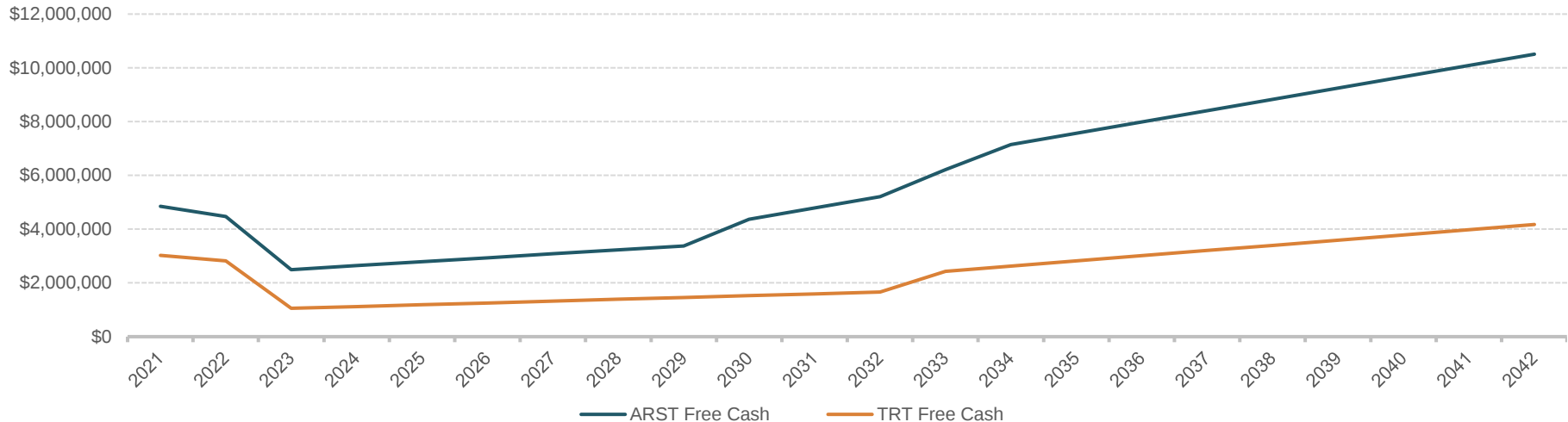

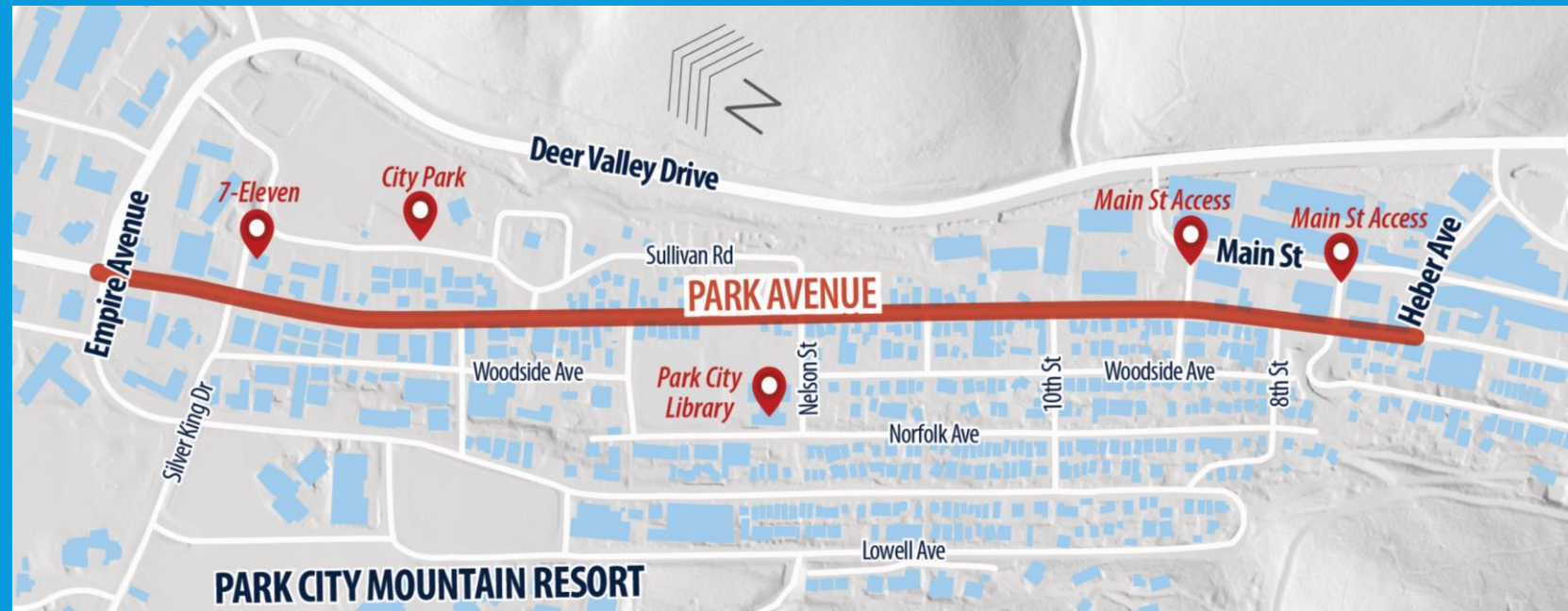

## Lower Park Ave Survey

Park City will be upgrading utilities on PARK AVENUE FROM EMPIRE AVENUE TO HEBER AVENUE which will require reconstruction of the road. We have the opportunity to make changes to the final roadway configuration and want your feedback on what the final solution should be.

Following a community outreach effort in fall 2020, Park City implemented a pilot project to include dedicated and shared bike lanes on Lower Park Avenue. The improvements were implemented in spring of 2021 and now that a year has passed, the City would like to touch base with the community to determine WHAT'S WORKING and WHAT'S NOT along this important corridor.

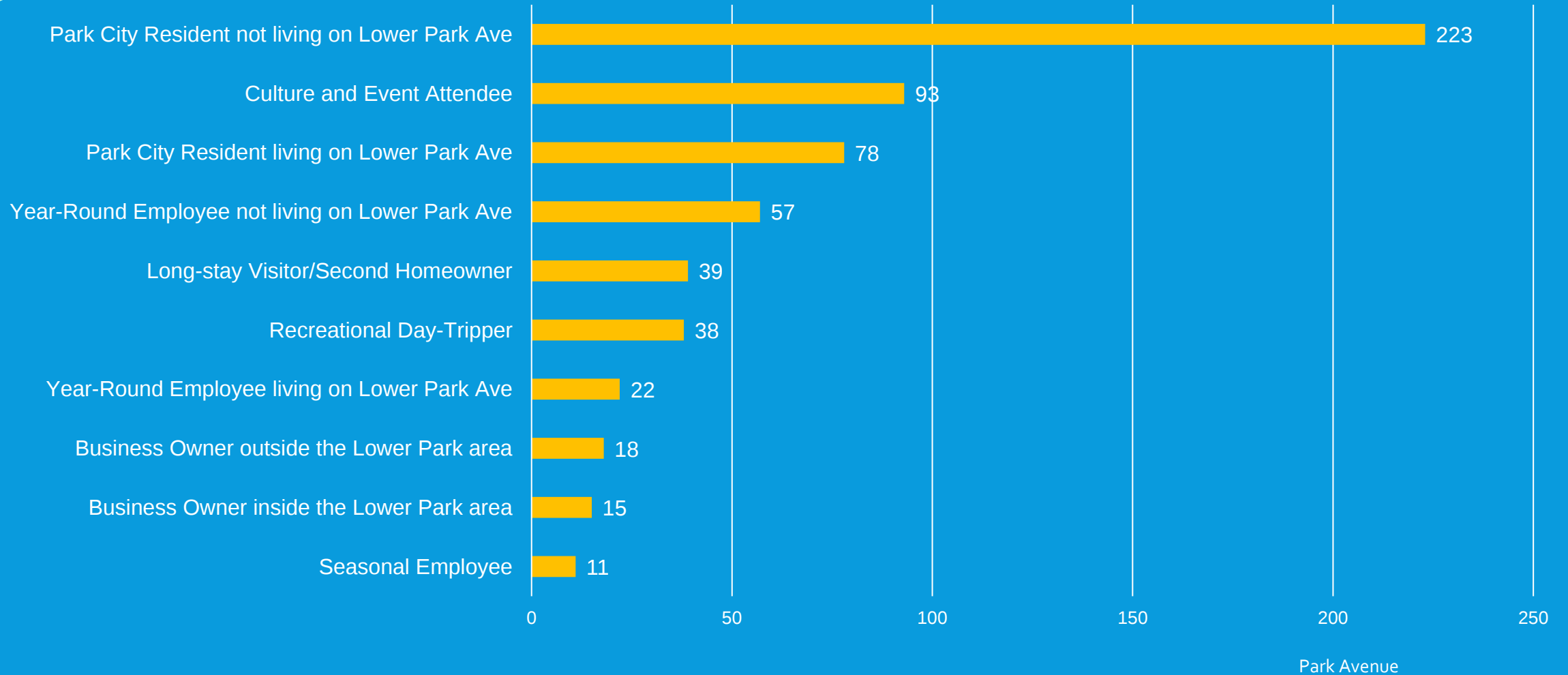

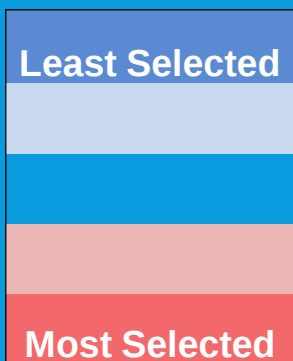

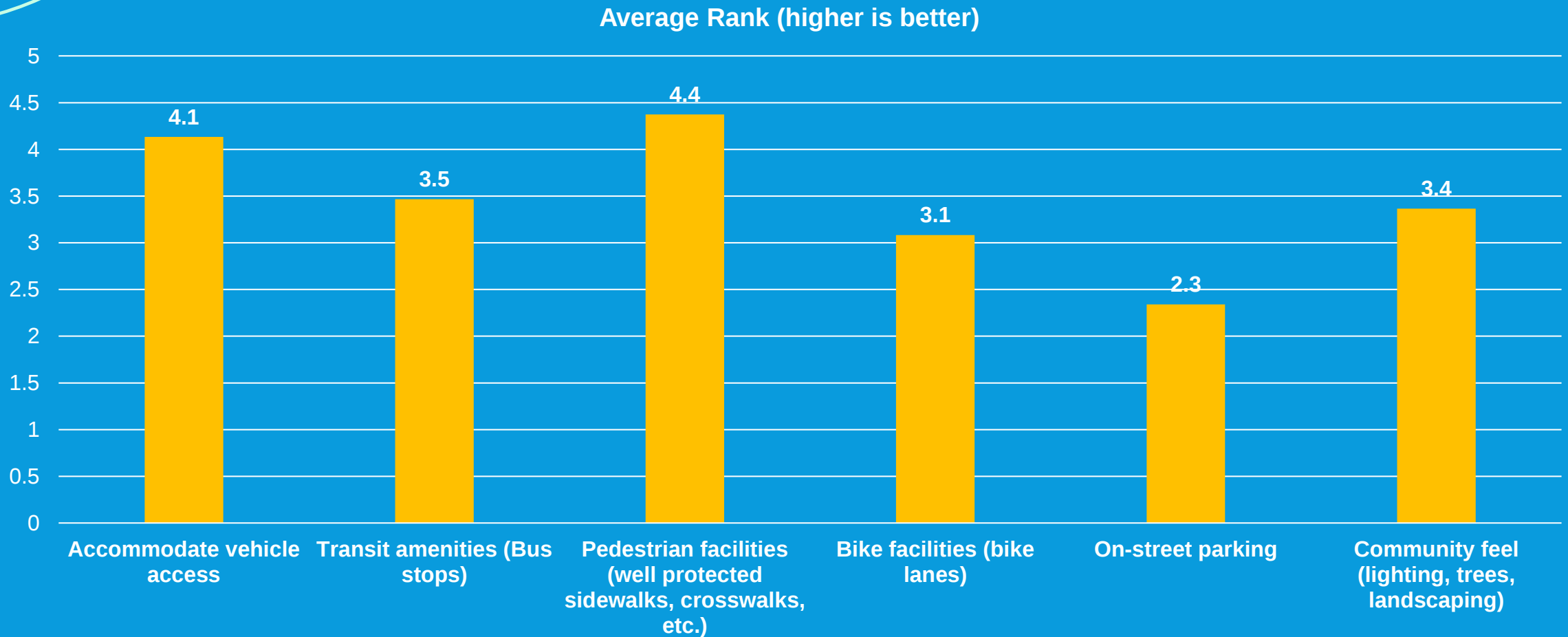


# HOW DO YOU TRAVEL ALONG LOWER PARK AVE? (SELECT ALL THAT APPLY)

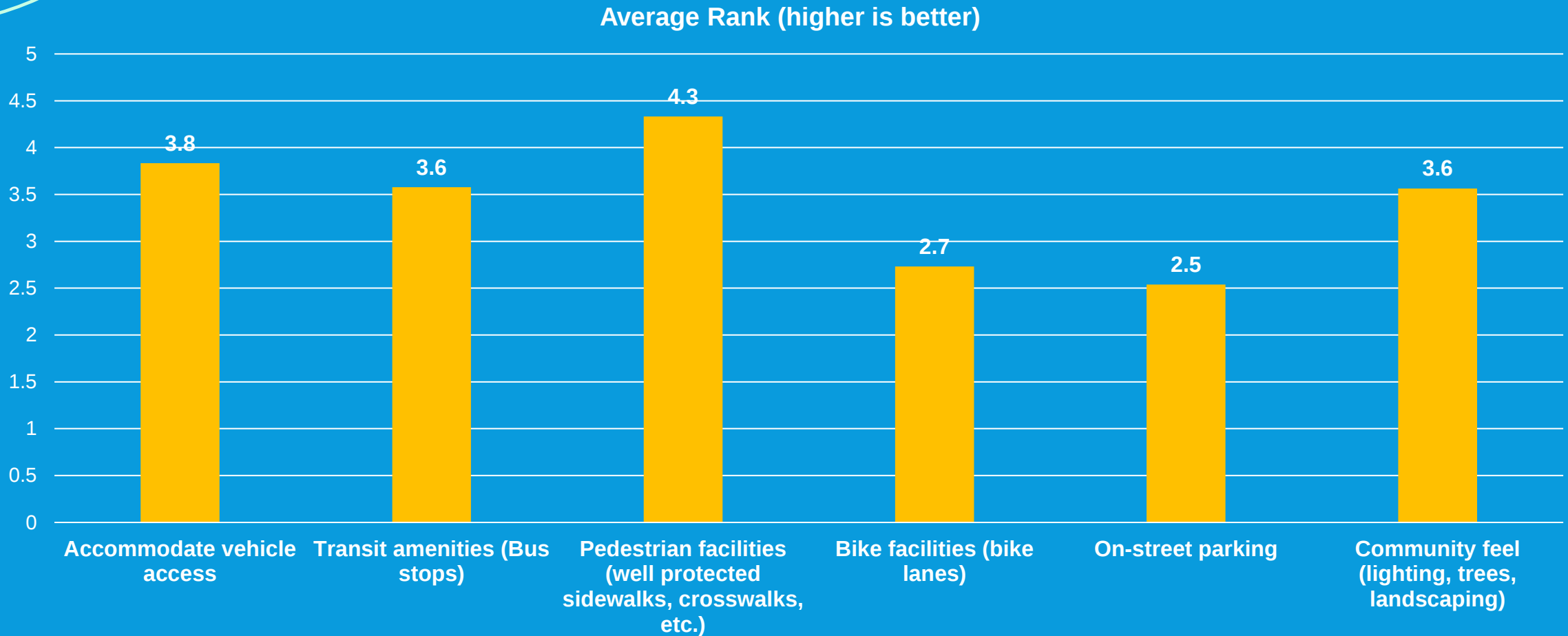

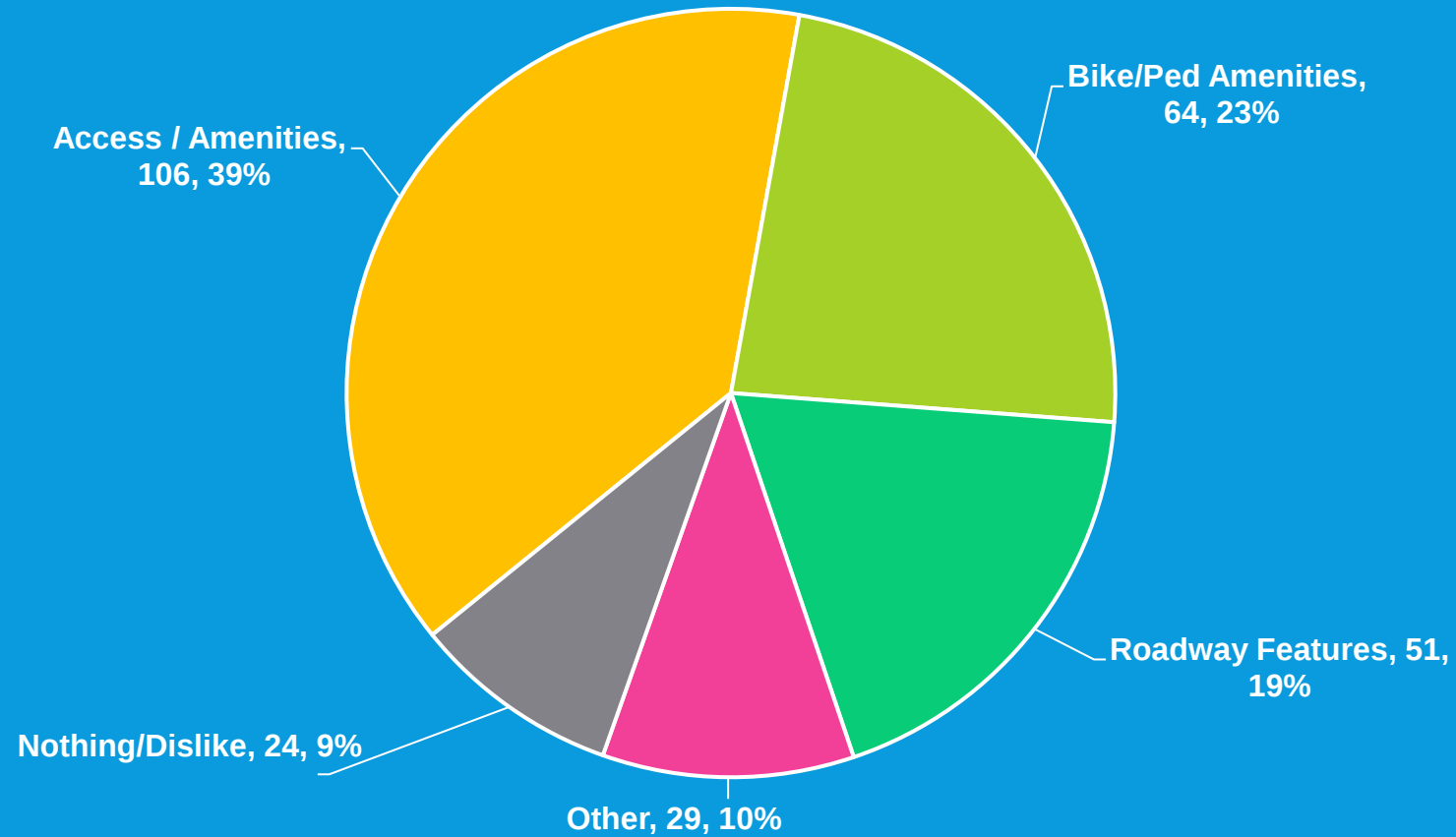
# WHAT IS MOST IMPORTANT TO YOU ON LOWER PARK AVE? (RANK THESE IN ORDER OF IMPORTANCE)

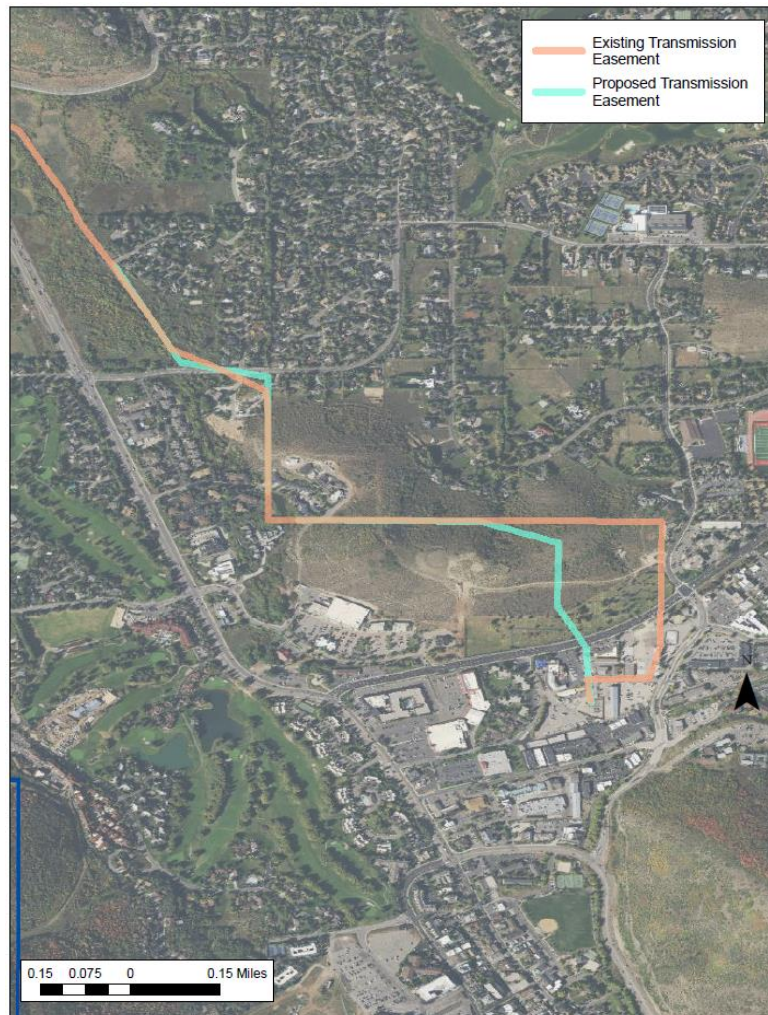

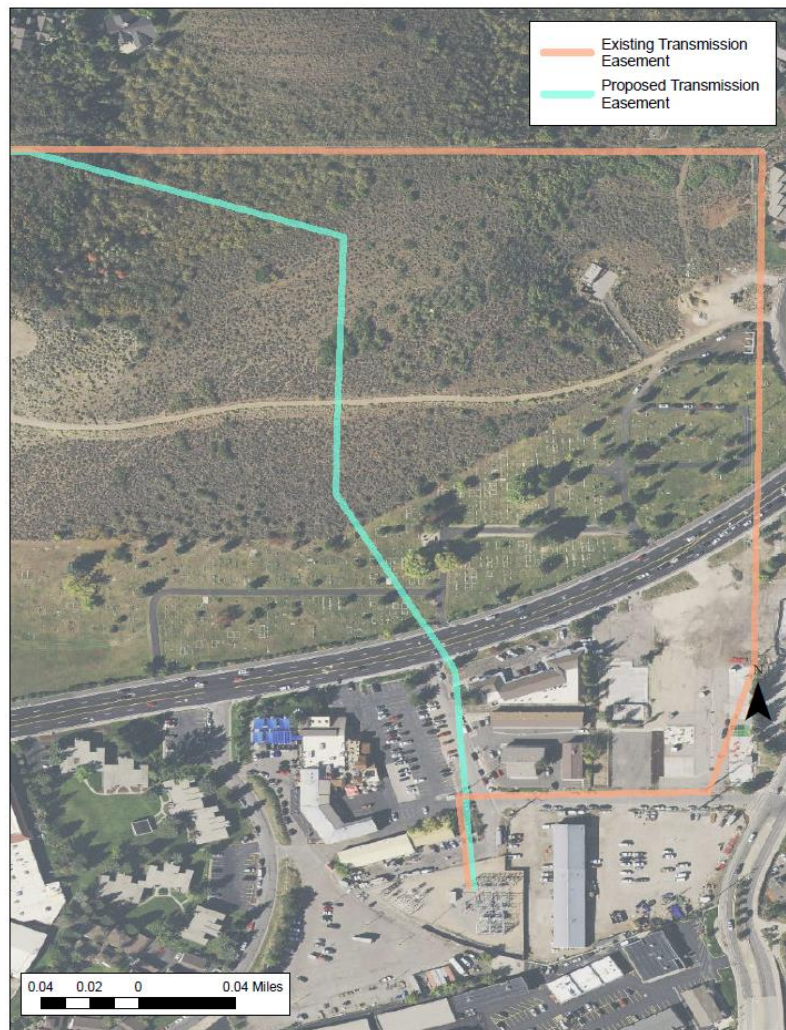

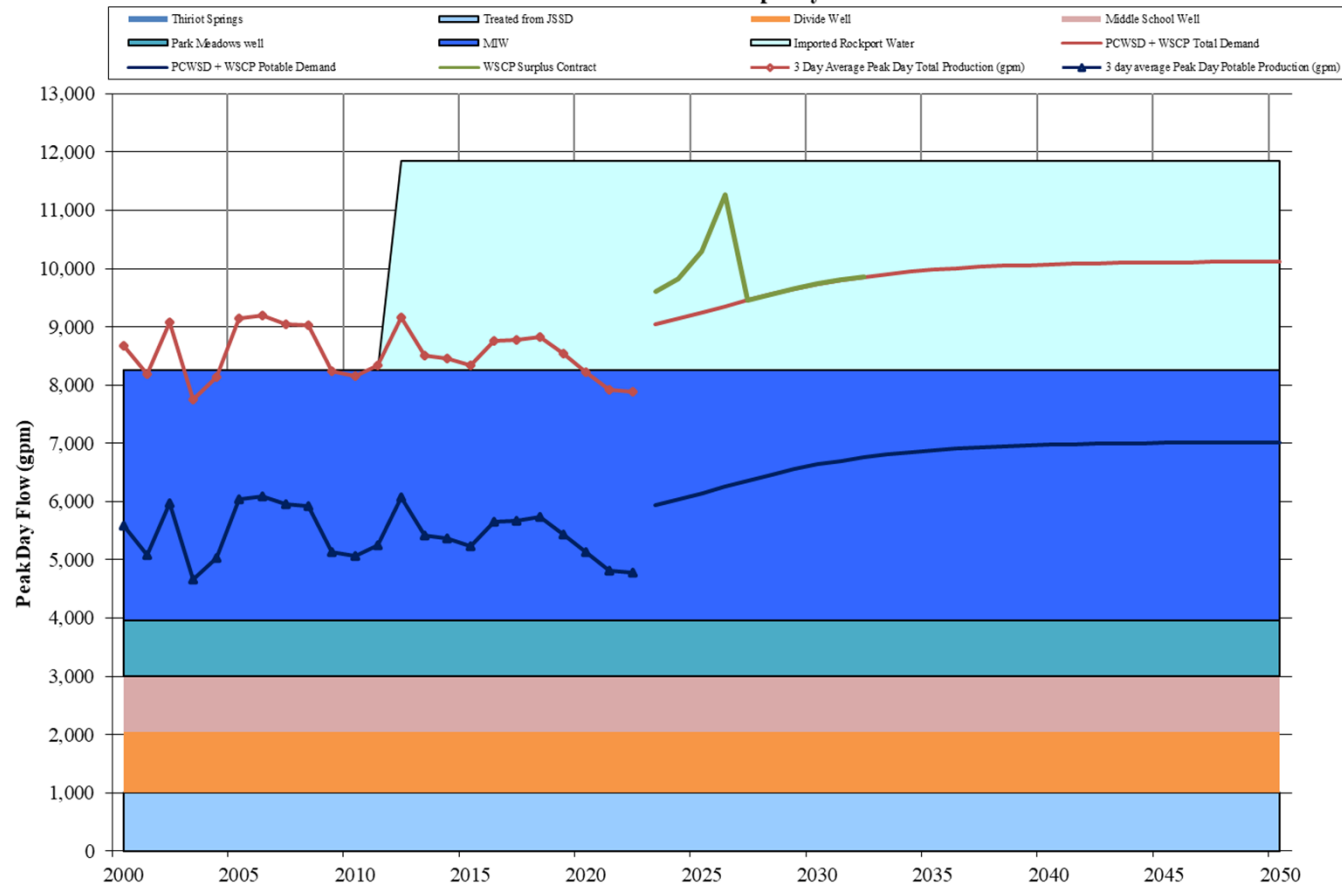

Gene DeSantis eComment: “I live at 988 W Abigail Drive, Kamas, Utah. I do not live, and never have lived in Hideout (though at least one member of the Council has repeatedly told people I do). The PC MARC is a wonderful facility. I have been going there from the time I moved here in Dec, 2014. It was great when I was a tennis player, and absolutely horrible when I became a pickleball player. The Racquet Club was built decades ago as a private tennis club. Park City bought it, and in 2010 did a great job of renovating and expanding it. Sadly, because of the attitudes of its Director, Ken Fisher, it is being run in 2023 as if it were still a private tennis club. PB players are afforded little opportunity to book courts in the bubble. We not only get very few hours, but also only the worst hours – when it opens at dawn or the evening hours before it closes. PB players are never able to book a bubble court during “prime time”. Not ever. Mr. Fisher has misled the City Council by providing incomplete information and offering indefensible rationalizations for this. He has said repeatedly that tennis brings in far more revenue, and thus should get the most hours. But as I have told the Council before, if you do a deeper dive, you will see:

- Tennis court reservation revenue dropped by over \$28K last year
- Growth in tennis revenue was attributable to lessons, not court bookings
- PB court reservation revenue rose by over \$22K last year (despite the paucity of hours and the worst possible times).
- PB total revenue is up over 400% in the last two years
- Tennis does not get more hours because it brings in more money; it brings in more money because it gets far more – and better- hours

Mr. Fisher and RAB liaison Max Doilney have offered as a second rationale that the MARC is a “purpose built” facility, and that its primary purpose was and should continue to be tennis. I previously shared an Op Ed I wrote for the Park City Record in which that argument was dismantled. Further, I ask the Council to consider if the use of a public facility in 2023 should be determined by the purpose for which it was built – as a private tennis club – decades ago. Finally, I ask whether a Council that meets in a repurposed school should cling to the absurd notion that a facility’s use should be dictated by the purpose for which it was first built. I have repeatedly asked this body to look at how many times bubble courts go unbooked. We get e-mails from Cole Johnson several times a week notifying us that the MARC has opened courts for PB the next day. Bear in mind that we only get these e-mails if every court is open. If two people are playing singles on one bubble court, 16 people are blocked from playing PB. Is this the best use of public courts? How much money is the MARC losing? In his Nov 3, 2022 Report to the City Council, Ken Fisher identified 3 things the MARC was doing “to accommodate the growing demand by the pickleball community for access to indoor tennis courts”. Let’s take a closer look. Number 1 on Ken’s list was giving PB players more hours for drop in play in the gym. Clearly more hours in the gym does not give PB players greater access to the indoor tennis courts. It is completely unresponsive. Number 2 on Ken’s list was releasing unused tennis courts at 11 AM the day before rather than 11 AM the same day. This is completely misleading and entirely unacceptable. First, the MARC only releases bubble courts if all three are empty. Again, remember that if two people are playing singles tennis on one court, the MARC does not release the other two courts. They sit unused. Second, tennis players have had one full week to book bubble

courts; PB players get one day. This is blatantly unfair. Number 3 on Ken's list was ending the right of PB players to reserve courts from 7-10 PM on Tuesday and Thursday. He instead dedicated those hours to "open play" and allowed up to 48 people to sign up, even though only 24 can play at a time. Taking away court reservation hours and converting them to "open play" is quite literally robbing Peter to pay Paul. PB players got no added hours. Indeed, In my old days as a consumer lawyer, we would have referred to this as a scam – double booking the same space and charging twice for something half the buyers are unable to use. Attached is a picture taken on Tuesday, Jan. 24. That evening at least 35 people paid \$10 each to play "open pickleball". There were always 11 people shut out at any given time, waiting for their "opportunity" to play. This happens regularly. Every time a game ends, 4 players walk off their court, interrupting the play of every court they must cross to put their paddles in the slots awaiting their turn. Then 4 other players walk across the court, again interrupting play as they head to the open court. This happens continuously. Because the number of people and the distribution of skill levels is random, the games are almost always worse. You invariably are forced to either "play up" (play with people better than you) or "play down" (play with people worse than you). Either way it ruins the game. The PB players are charged more money (\$10 instead of \$8.50), they play fewer games (because of all the time they must sit out) and the games are of lesser quality / enjoyment. And it takes 3 hours instead of 2. Ken often says he does not want to "degrade the tennis experience" but seems to be perfectly happy to completely degrade the PB experience on Tuesday and Thursday nights. Many of us have stopped going. And over 120 members of the PCPB Club have joined the private club in Sandy. I wonder why the MARC did not institute "open play" for tennis players...could it be because they (quite rightly) would never stand for it? This is how Ken Fisher has "accommodated the growing demand by the pickleball community for access to indoor tennis courts". He has done nothing of the sort. Your own survey showed demand for PB courts (26.5%) nearly double the next two items respondents listed – year round trails (13.8%) and cross country ski trails (13.5%). You clearly recognize the huge demand for indoor PB courts, as it has prompted a significant investment in the Quinns Junction project. And yet the MARC continues to give PB players even fewer opportunities to book a bubble court than we had last year – all while tennis courts often sit empty. It's time to run the MARC like a public municipal and recreational facility – not like the private tennis club it used to be. You can take action NOW to remedy the injustice while we await construction of new facilities. The aspirational goal of new dedicated indoor PB courts in 3 or 4 years is no excuse for doing nothing today. PB deserves parity, now. Here are some immediate steps that the Council can take tomorrow:

- Give PB players an opportunity to book bubble courts during "prime time" at least 4 hours each day
- Switch off peak hours so that they do not always go to PB and prime time always goes to tennis
- Implement a pilot program where both PB and tennis share the bubble on a first come, first served basis
- If tennis players do not book a court, allow PB players to book them 5 days out (instead of 1 day)

Here is an example of how these principles could be applied each day of the week in the bubble:

Monday: PB only from 4-10 PM (tennis gets the rest of the day)

Tuesday: PB only 6 AM to noon, tennis only 12 noon to 7 PM, PB open play 7-10 PM

Wednesday: PB only from 4-10 PM (tennis gets the rest of the day)

Thursday: PB only 6-10 AM, tennis 10 AM-4 PM, mixed use 4 PM to 10 PM

Friday: PB only 4-10 PM (tennis gets the rest of the day)

Saturday: mixed use all day

Sunday: tennis 7 AM to 1 PM, PCPB Club play 1-5 PM, PB only 5-9 PM

If you were to adopt these types of changes, you'd please far more people, the MARC would significantly increase its revenue, and you would better serve the MARC's mission. You would be running the MARC like the public facility it is, rather than the private tennis club it was. Let me close with one final point. You are going to vote tonight on whether to approve \$7-9 million dollars for a dedicated PB indoor and outdoor complex at Quinn's Junction. If you believe that the exploding popularity of the sport, and the immense growth in demand for courts warrants that (and I believe it does), then why has Ken Fisher advised this Council not to more equitably allocate bubble court times now? To build Quinns while simultaneously doing nothing about bubble usage is quite literally telling the PB community we will help you several years from now, but in the meantime, we care only about tennis. Because after all, that was the purpose for which the Racquet Club was built.

Angie Lampert eComment: "Thank you for taking the time to include input from the community in expanding the facilities as the Park City Sports Complex. As a parent of a figure skater who currently trains 12-14 hours per week, I would ask you to consider a second ice sheet to this complex. The only ice currently available from the Park City Ice Arena for our young figure skating athletes to train is before school beginning at 5:30am. Figure skating is the early morning side of this, but other ice sports are taking the late shift training until after 10pm at night. As you can imagine, this is not ideal for athletes who are also wanting to be at their best during a full school day. Please consider the effect this will have on so many young athletes in the early stages of the new development plan. The ice sports community has been actively proposing a solution to this problem for over a decade. The timing still seems right and definitely a prominent problem that is still top of mind when considering new facilities at the PC Sports Complex. My daughter skates on public ice sessions twice each week to get her training time in with limited ice availability. We often interact with visitors to our city who enjoy skating as a fun family friendly event. I think an additional ice sheet will serve the many athletes that dedicate countless hours as well as visitors to Park City for vacation, work, visiting family, etc."

Lisa Pressgrove eComment: "Thank you so much for hearing our sides. I am a figure skating mom to a 15 year old skater. We hope that you will consider making another rink for use for our many skaters in the Wasatch back including Summit County. We

have skaters coming from Park City, Coalville and Heber. My daughter has been making the drive for over 12 years from Heber City. Years ago, the council agreed to a second sheet of ice and it got taken off when there was a potential for another sheet. We (all skating disciplines) have used ice for around 19-20 hours a day and these skaters are fighting for training time. We have National Competitors at our rink that get up to be on the ice at 530. My daughter is up at 0420. A new sheet would allow for more training time and times that are more conducive to children. A seasonal sheet would be nice but an enclosed sheet (that was originally agreed to) would be even better. Or a year round outdoor rink like the one found in Sun Valley, Idaho. We could do shows that would draw tourists and other performers as well. Thank you for considering the welfare of our skaters including figure skaters, hockey players, sledge, etc.”

Anna Biskup eComment: “I’m excited about all new plans for Park City. We have wonderful town and people who care about their health and physical fitness. My daughter is a 15 y/old figure skater who needs to get up to get to ice rink 6xweek at 4.30 am as the only time the ice is available for figure skaters is early in the morning and sporadically in the afternoon. The ice time is divided between hockey and other ice activities and usually busy 20 h /day with very little public skating time. This creates very crowded and not always safe environment as it also limits young people potential and availability for visitors. I see a strong indication and need for another ice rink (seasonal at least) and I hope our voices will be heard as PC Figure Skating Club is growing bigger and stronger every year. We need PC to support your young community members as well as grieving interest of our visitors. Over last few years we have more visitors coming to ice rink for skating as our visitors often find it very rewarding, yet crowd starts to be as big as on the top of the mountains. We definitely need more ice rinks in PC. Please help us and future if PC.”

Kate Pressgrove eComment: “As a figure skating club member that has been a part of the sport for over 12 years, I would like to kindly remind the council that we are still here. I was here almost a decade ago when plans fell through for an additional rink. Now everyday we must wake up at 4:30 or earlier, just to get the ice time we need. I myself wake up at 4:20 six days a week in order to drive from Wasatch County to Park City in time to be on the ice to train. Not only has this issue impacted the figure skaters, but also all others from the skating community. Our rink operates almost 20 hours a day to accommodate the demand for ice time. Especially during the winter months, private parties and rentals take away precious training hours. Please consider the skating community and add a seasonal rink in your preliminary plans.”

Sitinee Sheffert eComment: “I am writing to express my enthusiasm for the new facilities being developed at Quinn's junction. I would like to extend my gratitude to all those who have contributed their time and effort to make this project a reality. My daughter, who is a figure skater, has been a part of the club for several years now and we have witnessed the overwhelming demand for ice time that greatly surpasses the existing capacity. As you may be aware, the current ice schedules are quite demanding, with hockey games starting as late as 11pm and skaters hitting the ice as early as 5:30am before school. Despite these challenges, the skating community continues to grow and

attract skaters from all over the country to come train. It is for this reason that I am writing to you to request your support in considering a seasonal rink in the early phases of planning. Approximately 10-12 years ago, the skating community rallied for another rink, and the city did listen. However, with the promise of a rink at Black Rock by private developers, the push for the second sheet was put on hold. Now, 10 years later, with no additional ice and more skaters at higher levels, the need for another rink is more pressing than ever. As a winter sports community that attracts visitors from around the world, a seasonal outside rink, equipped with refrigeration to ensure proper ice conditions, aligns well with the interests of our community and visitors. The rink would not only alleviate the stress of scheduling and demanding ice time, but it would also provide more opportunities for our residents and visitors to enjoy winter activities. I believe that the addition of a seasonal rink would greatly benefit the community and I urge you to give it your consideration.”

Stephanie Bass eComment: “About a decade ago a group of figure skaters wearing their dresses came to council meeting and asked city council to solve the limited ice problem at the Park City Ice Arena. Nothing happened. Since then, our skaters have adjusted. Olympic figure skating hopefuls as young as 8-year-old are waking up at 4:30am to get fed, warmed up, and on the ice to train by 5:30am. This is a very hard and unsustainable schedule for these elite athletes. As the council considers recreational opportunities at the Sports Complex at Quinn’s the skaters would like to remind them that we are still here, the need for more ice has only increase since the last time we skated into the chambers. As you consider new requests for recreation we kindly ask that you keep the figure skaters/curlers/speed skaters/public skaters/hockey skaters/sledge hockey/ and all other ice aficionados in mind during the preliminary stages of your planning.”

Shelley Gillwald eComment: “I am writing on behalf of the Park City Soccer Club in support of lighting the Stadium field at PC Sports Complex. Living in a mountain environment, long shadows impact the visibility on our fields much earlier than elsewhere. By September 1 we have sunset at 8pm and there are very few venues for our teams to host games during our Fall League season, or train in the late evening other times of the year. Currently, the only lit fields available to our youth are the turf and “D” fields at the Park City Sports Complex; I would image priority given to PC Rec adult rec league activities is why we are never scheduled at City Park. Even at Quinn’s, we find ourselves competing for lit fields with the adult kickball, softball and 7 v 7 soccer programs, not to mention high school sports, youth lacrosse, and even other soccer programs. Due to a shortage of soccer referees statewide, we are directed by our State Association to schedule weeknight games back-to-back, creating the most efficiency in sending teams of referees to Park City. However, with a 5:30 start for the first game, and games lasting anywhere from 75-90 minutes, we spend most of the Fall season (late August through early November) trying to schedule and re-schedule games for our teenaged teams on just two fields across our whole community; these games are usually restricted to 2 nights per week at that. A third lit field would make a significant difference. We truly believe that the recent study does not accurately represent the frustration and desire for lit fields among our 500+ families. The majority of our

membership is comprised of young active families, juggling soccer practice with other activities, then racing home for dinner, homework or family time. Advocacy just does not rate as a priority, and they certainly do not have the same leisure time to attend City Council meetings as some of the other sports clubs seeking to be heard in our community.”

Shirin Spangenberg eComment: “City Council, Mayor and especially Staff, thank you for your time in improving our recreational opportunities in Park City. When it comes to the priorities of the city I hope that you would consider the proposed Pickleball courts as your first priority. It seems to be the low hanging fruit. Less expensive than the other proposals and appeasing the large number of pickleball players in Park City. It's probably the best ROI of the improvements. It's frustrating that our times are so limited during the winter. On another note, I love the idea of putting in LED lighting in the park!”

Anthony DiCicco eComment: “I am currently the girls and boys varsity soccer coach at PCHS. I write today to address an inequality that exists here in Park City as it relates to our high school girls' program. The girls' soccer program is the only high school field sport that due to the demands of football at Dozier Field during the fall have historically been moved off-site for trainings and games. With girls' soccer being a fall sport, we consistently run into issues regarding daylight on the Park City Sports Complex (Quinn's) Stadium Field. It is with that context that I strongly and emphatically urge you to approve the funding for lights at PC Sports Complex Stadium Field. In addition to the benefits to other sports programming in town, this approval would send a strong message that we in Park City value the participation and inclusion of girls and women's sports in our town. Yesterday being National Girls' and Women in Sports Day served as an important reminder that although Title IX was passed 50 years ago, access to equitable facilities and the necessary support continues to be a battle that girls and women are forced to confront on a daily basis. Funding these lights would also garner additional support, make our games more of a community event and enable parents and families that are not currently able to attend afternoon games due to work more accessible. I thank you for your consideration and your service to our community. I'm available to discuss this further if you have any additional questions regarding the importance of this initiative as we continue to champion the benefits of lifelong physical literacy and the benefits of team sports and civic pride in Park City.”

Emily Boyd eComment: “I am a parent of a figure skater and a former board member of the Figure Skating Club of Park City. The potential for expanding recreation opportunities at Quinn's Junction is very exciting. So first, thank you to everyone who has worked on the Master Plan to get us to this point. The Park City skating community (figure skating, hockey, curling, school programs - all of us) feel the impacts of limited ice time every day. While this is truly a year-round issue, winter comes with additional challenges in the form of private rentals, tournaments, and events that make it even more difficult for skaters to train sufficiently (and at reasonable hours). My 12-year-old was hoping to attend this meeting and provide a comment in person, but she has to wake up at 4:30am on Fridays, as freestyle ice is only programmed between 5:30 and 7:30am (with one additional hour later during school hours). So she will be trying to get

to sleep while public comments begin tonight. On the other end of the rink's operating hours, I recently was made aware that a hockey game would be starting at 11pm tonight. I think it goes without saying that a second ice sheet, even seasonally, would alleviate some of the programming and training challenges for a rink that is currently programmed 19.5 hours a day. I also believe that a seasonal outdoor rink aligns perfectly with the interests of our community and winter visitors - who come to Park City from around the world to experience our winter sports town. Please consider including the seasonal rink in the early phases of planning for this exciting development opportunity."

Justin Taylor eComment: "I am writing to express my support for enhancements being considered as they relate to Nordic ski facilities at Quinn's. My family moved to town in the early 2000s and during that first winter fell in love with cross country skiing. Currently, we have three kids participating on the PCSS Nordic Team- one on Comp and two in the Devo program. I also volunteer my time 3 days a week to the club as a PCSS coach. As you know, cross country skiing is very popular in our town and continues to grow significantly year over year. It is an all-ages, all-abilities, life-long sport, and unlike most other winter activities, is more broadly accessible to all of our community members across the socio-economic spectrum. Emma Garrard and the Nordic team have done an amazing job creating opportunities, and this year I understand that 45% of participants of the "next generation" Mini Gliders, the youngest members of the PCSS Nordic program, are of our Latinx community, directly supporting City Council's mission for social equity and involvement. I have witnessed many improvements to our community's xc skiing experience over the years, and in particular, through our community's open space organizations/initiatives, and Mountain Trails and Basin Rec which do a remarkable job in grooming, maintaining and enhancing the public trails system. Currently, however, our community lacks several public infrastructure elements as they relate to xc skiing, which can be addressed via improvements at Quinn's. Our community would greatly benefit from a Nordic center where participants could gather, have a snack, stretch, prep their equipment, use the restroom, etc. This facility would be used year-round- during the winter by skiers/bikers/hikers, and during the summer by bikers/hikers. Centers such as this exist in many premier cross-country communities. Adjacent to this facility should be novice-level trails and a groomed open space that can support newer skiers/kids as they learn and play games on skis (such as "sharks and minnows", which in addition to being fun for the kids during practice, it is an extremely effective method leveraged by xc coaches around the world for helping kids improve their agility and become better skiers). Additionally, positioning the Nordic center/parking on the "trails" side of the road will address safety and usability concerns that currently exist. As required now, skiers must tote equipment, and walk dogs across the road from the parking area. I've witnessed close calls and know of dogs that have gotten hit. This situation is especially dangerous for children, who are often crossing at 545 pm in the winter as the sun is setting, and where drivers are leaving the Ice Arena and navigating around the corner on Gillmor Way. Thank you for your time and your consideration as you contemplate and approve enhancements to PCSC at Quinn's Junction."

Midge Farkas eComment: "I am writing to plead the council's approval for the critical need for additional ice at the Quinn's Junction Ice Arena. The community has long outgrown this facility. I am also writing in particular about the segment of the community that is underserved by the lack of available public ice sessions. I have skated weekly at this arena for the past 17 years - ice skating is a sport that promotes both physical and mental well being. This year-round rink was a major factor in why I chose to make Park City my year round home. Sadly, the available ice time has become very, very limited for public use. And, as I am now a senior skater, it is not appropriate for me to skate at the competitive ice times for free -style skate sessions. So, I am writing on behalf of a number of peer, adult skaters and new skaters that have expressed concerns to PC rink management about the lack of scheduling, timing and duration for public skate sessions. The Park City ice rink and staff have done an exceptional job over the years of providing a full-service arena for many different skating disciplines. But it has long ago outgrown its current size. We desperately need more ice surface to provide a safe and enjoyable environment for all that want to enjoy this sport and grow in this sport. As an adult senior skater it has become almost impossible for me to feel comfortable on the ice when so many people and types of skaters are using the ice... from hockey players, to freestyle jumpers, to beginners! It's simply nerve racking and unsafe. As Park City continues to aspire to serve its sports minded community, it now needs to address the growing need of the ice skating community of all ages and disciplines. Thank you for considering these comments and hopefully your decision to move forward with an additional ice sheet to meet the needs of the community."

Mary Robinson eComment: "Since there is nothing that I feel I can add to the letter so eloquently written by Ms. Farkas, I would simply like to state that I agree to every aspect of her letter. Simply, we need more quality ice and ice times in Park City. I too have skated for a number of years and have struggled over the past year to enjoy the sport due to the limited ice times available. I think it's important for me to state that for many of my skating peers, skating is not just a sport but rather an essential part of our mental and physical wellbeing. The last comment I will make is that we pay a flat annual fee to cover our ice time. I am told that this year that fee will increase to \$400. I was a little stunned that this fee would be increased when the sessions have been decreased. It is important to understand that some of us still work and can't make it to every session, we simply need more options. So in closing, I hope that you will consider the current demand for ice that is simply not being met at this time."

Joe Plomin eComment: "The Park City Pickleball Club (PCPC) urges the Mayor and City Council to approve a plan for a dedicated indoor pickleball complex as a first recreation priority and a mating 16 outdoor court complex.
