Toby Ross, City Manager; Jodi Hoffman, City Attorney, Myles Rademan, Public Affairs Director; Ron Ivie, Chief Building Official, Hope Bleecker, Transportation Director

Absent: Paul Sincock

1. Council questions/comments. Hugh Daniels requested a roster of the Council members and boards and commissions and the answers to Paul Sincock's questions on the Town Lift Project. He reported on the session he attended at the state legislature and suggested that liaison appointments be reviewed in March or April to make sure that they are working well for everyone. Chuck Klingenstein discussed the lighting at Dan's Foods and the parking situation at Mike Hale Chevrolet. Roger Harlan advised that there is graffiti on a Park Avenue Condo at the intersection of SR248 and SR224 and Mr. Klingenstein pointed out the graffiti on a bridge at Snow Creek Crossing.

Councilman Harlan reported that the materials checked out of the library in 1995 was 94,384, compared to 87,840 in 1994. There have been 1,293 new resident cards issued and 315 non-resident cards. He noted that he attended the Board of Health meeting this week where he brought up the Council's concern regarding auto emissions. Mr. Harlan also stated that he attended a Parks, Recreation and Beautification Board meeting and the board will be approaching the Council for financial support for the tree planting project.

2. Strategy for publicizing Council's goals. Myles Rademan stated that this was a Council retreat topic and one of the suggestions was neighborhood meetings. He pointed out that the Miners Hospital is booked and discussed other locations in town, including private living rooms. Mr. Rademan discussed Council personally inviting people to ensure attendance and also suggested that two council members address established various groups at their meetings. Part of the Leadership 2000 sessions will include the discussion of Council's goals with 75 individuals and Mr. Rademan discussed radio and TV interviews and the possibility of televising Council meetings. Some other ideas not discussed at the retreat include publishing a newsletter, electronically publishing the goals on the Internet, or sponsoring a public forum on what direction the City should take during the coming year.

Hugh Daniels supported attending meetings of various groups and suggested distributing a newsletter with a response section to get information back to Council. Mr. Daniels felt that inviting people is a good idea, but stressed that although he wants to get feedback from the public, he did not want to go overboard on the effort. Shauna Kerr suggested informal neighborhood

meetings in Old Town, Park Meadows and the Library. She was in favor of personally inviting 10 or 20 people with a variety of interests and going door-to-door with invitations, and suggested visiting with residents in the new affordable housing projects. She felt that the meetings should be held within the next two weeks and that they be concentrated. Ms. Kerr suggested that after there is input on priorities and goals are fully established to publish a newsletter with time frames for projects. Chuck Klingenstein agreed with Ms. Kerr and felt that the community living room at the Miners Hospital should be used at some point, Majors in Park Meadows and perhaps somewhere in Deer Valley. He felt this should happen in a tight time frame and was willing to speak to different groups in twos. Mr. Klingenstein felt that only the Council meetings covering important issues should be televised.

Ms. Kerr suggested that the goals be displayed in the work session room and Council chambers. Roger Harlan felt that private living rooms are a better idea than a restaurant. Discussion ensued regarding having a newsletter underwritten and it was decided to have the City fund this particular newsletter. Council decided to hold meetings February 5, 6, and 7. Myles Rademan stated that he will prepare invitations but that it is Council's job to get people at meetings and after the meetings, he will prepare a newsletter.

3. Review of regular meeting. There was a brief review of the Municipal Code update and Ron Ivie explained the two to three year pattern of updates of various state codes. See staff report.

Americans with Disabilities Plan for Park City, Utah. See attached staff report. Hope Bleecker explained that federal guidelines mandate that if someone cannot use a bus because of a disability that some complimentary paratransit must be provided. She reviewed the six criteria including operating 3/4 of a mile within the fixed service route and Park City exceeds that requirement. The City also complies with response time, which must be at least next day service. Another guideline is that one passenger cannot be given priority over another. Ms. Bleecker described this next guideline as not meeting the criteria exactly but that it meets with the federal government's and UDOT's approval. Park City operates in peak seasons and shoulder seasons where there is no bus service. However, paratransit services are available from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. every day with the exception of holidays. She continued that currently there are no capacity constraints and the City service averages about 3.4 passengers per hour, for a total of 6,938 passengers a year. There have been no complaints or service requests that the Transportation Department has not met. Meechie White, Director of the National Abilities Center, stated that she felt the Transportation Department does a great job and that it has been her experience that service is very accommodating.

4. City party for snow-making crews. In appreciation of the great job that the snow-making crews have done this season, Ms. Kerr recommended that the City sponsor a party for the

workers. City Park was discussed as a location and the City Manager indicated that he would contact the Park City Ski Area and Deer Valley regarding a good time to hold it.

SUMMARY RECOMMENDATIONS:

Adopt the proposed Ordinance amending the Municipal Code to reflect the current editions of the building codes as adopted by state law.

DESCRIPTION:

A. Topic: Uniform Building Code, Mechanical Code, Housing Code, Uniform Code for the Abatement of Dangerous Buildings, Electrical Code, Uniform Fire Code, and Uniform Sign Code.

B. Background: The Park City Municipal Code currently uses the 1990 or 1991 editions of the building codes. These building codes must be updated under state law.

C. Analysis: Updating the building codes would provide the public with notice of the recent building code changes, allow easier and more efficient enforcement of the building codes, and ensure that the building codes are consistent with state law.

D. Department Review: The Building Department and the Legal Department have reviewed this proposal.

ALTERNATIVES:

A. Approve the Request: The building codes will be updated and meet state law requirements.

B. Deny the Request: This is not a permanent option because of state law preemption.

C. Continue the Item: If the Council desires public input or has questions, the proposal may be continued until the next meeting.

D. Do Nothing: Again, this is not a permanent option because of state law preemption.

SIGNIFICANT IMPACTS: None.

CONSEQUENCES OF NOT TAKING THE RECOMMENDED ACTION: The City will not be following state law which mandates that the City maintain updated building codes.

RECOMMENDATION: Adopt the proposed ordinance.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 11 OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE
TO UPDATE THE EFFECTIVE EDITIONS OF BUILDING CODES

WHEREAS, the City Council has determined that updated building rules and regulations safeguard the health, safety, and property of the community; and

WHEREAS, updating the building codes facilitates customer service and the community's general knowledge of the law;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PARK CITY, UTAH THAT:

SECTION I. Amendment. Section 11-3-1 of the Municipal Code of Park City ("MCPC") is hereby amended to read as follows:

11-3-1. UNIFORM BUILDING CODE ADOPTED. The Uniform Building Code, 1994 edition ~~1991 edition~~, establishing rules and regulations for the design, construction quality of materials, use and occupancy, location and maintenance of building and structures, as adopted by the International Conference of Building Officials, is hereby adopted as the Building Code of Park City, together with the following amendments.

(A) Chapters 11, Divisions 1 and 2, Chapters 12, Division 2, Chapters 13, Chapters 15, Chapters 16, Division 1, Chapters ~~23, Divisions 1 and 4,~~ and Chapters 30, 31, 32, 33, 35, 51, 53, and 70 located in the appendix of the Uniform Building Code are adopted and incorporated herein.

(B) Section 107.1 ~~304(a)~~ of the Uniform Building Code is amended as follows:
SECTION 107.1 304(a) BUILDING PERMIT FEES. A fee for each building permit shall be paid to the Building Official as set forth by fee resolution as adopted by the Park City Council.

(C) Section ~~904.2.1 3802(a)~~ AUTOMATIC FIRE EXTINGUISHING SYSTEMS is hereby amended as follows:

~~**PURPOSE.** The purpose of this section is to establish minimum standards to safeguard life, health, property, public welfare and to protect the owners and occupants of structures within Park City by regulating and controlling the design and construction of buildings and structures.~~

SECTION II. Amendment. Section 11-3-2 of the MCPC is hereby amended as follows:

11-3-2. AUTOMATIC FIRE EXTINGUISHING SYSTEMS. The following newly constructed structures of buildings used for or to be used for human occupancy shall have an automatic fire extinguishing system installed in conformity with the requirements of the Uniform

Building Code Standard 9-1, 9-2, and 9-3 ~~38-1-91~~:

- (A) All new construction having more than 6,000 square feet on any floor, except R-3 occupancy.
- (B) All new construction having more than two stories except R-3 occupancy.
- (C) All new construction having four or more dwelling units, including units rented or leased, and including condominiums or other separate ownership.
- (D) All new construction in the Historic Commercial Business zone district, regardless of occupancy.
- (E) All new construction and buildings in the General Commercial zone where there are no side-yard setbacks or where one or more of the side yard setbacks are less than two and one-half feet per story of height.
- (F) All existing buildings within the Historic Commercial Business District shall be required to be protected with a fire sprinkling system, in compliance with the Uniform Building Code Standards by August 15, 1996.

All newly constructed structures used as dwelling units in a multi-unit structure shall have at least a one hour fire resistive separation between units.

SECTION III. Amendment. Section 11-4-1 of the MCPC is hereby amended as follows:

11-4-1. MECHANICAL CODE. The Uniform Building Code, ~~1994 edition~~ ~~1991 edition~~, establishing rules and regulations for the design, construction quality of materials, use and occupancy, location and maintenance of building and structures, as adopted by the International Conference of Building Officials is hereby adopted as the Mechanical Code of Park City.

SECTION IV. Amendment. Section 11-5-1 of the MCPC is hereby amended as follows:

11-5-1. HOUSING CODE. The Uniform Housing Code, ~~1994 edition~~ ~~1991 edition~~, printed as code in book form, and adopted by the International Conference of Building Officials (providing minimum requirements for the protection of life, limb, health, safety and welfare of the general public and the owners and occupants of residential buildings) is hereby adopted as the Housing Code of Park City.

(A) **Application.** The provisions of the Housing Code shall apply to all buildings or portions thereof used, or designed for or intended to be used for human habitation. Occupancies in existing buildings may be continued as provided in Section 104(c) of the Uniform Building Code, except as to those structures found to be substandard as defined in the Housing Code.

(B) **Violations.** It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation whether as owner, lessee, sublessee, or occupant to erect, construct, enlarge, alter, repair, move, improve, remove, demolish,

equip, use, occupy, or maintain any building or premises or cause or permit the same to be done, contrary to or in violation of any of the provisions of Housing Code or any order issued by the Building Official pursuant thereto.

(C) **Permits and Inspections.** It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to erect, construct, enlarge, alter, repair, move, improve, remove, convert, or demolish any building or structure, or cause or permit the same to be done, without first obtaining a separate building permit for each such building or structure from the Building Official in the manner and according to the applicable conditions prescribed in the Housing Code.

SECTION V. Amendment. Section 11-6-1 of the MCPC is hereby amended as follows:

11-6-1. ADOPTION OF A CODE FOR THE ABATEMENT OF DANGEROUS BUILDINGS. The “Uniform Code for the Abatement of Dangerous Buildings, 1994 edition ~~1991 edition,~~” printed as a code in book form and adopted by the International Conference of Building Officials (providing for a just, equitable and practicable method whereby buildings or structure which from any cause endanger the life, limb, health, morals property, safety or welfare of the general public or their occupants, may be required to be repaired, vacated, or demolished) is hereby adopted as the Abatement of Dangerous Buildings Code for Park City.

SECTION VI. Amendment. Section 11-8-1 of the MCPC is hereby amended as follows:

11-8-1. ADOPTION OF ELECTRICAL CODE. The National Electrical Code, 1993 edition ~~1990 edition,~~ as adopted by the National Fire Protection Association and the American Standards Association and printed as a code in book form is hereby approved and adopted as the electrical code of this City, including all Park City and state amendments which are incorporated herein by this reference.

(A) **Electrical Inspection.** The Building Official shall perform all functions of electrical inspection and shall, among other things, inspect the construction, installation, and repair of all electrical light or power wiring, fixtures, appliances or apparatus installed within the limits of this municipality and shall require that they conform to the provisions of the Electrical Code. The Building Official shall follow as to electrical work the procedures relating to enforcement and safety as are established by the Uniform Building Code.

(B) **Permits, Inspections and Fees.** No alterations or additions shall be made in existing wiring, nor shall any new wiring be installed or any apparatus which generates, transmits, transforms or utilizes any electricity be installed without first obtaining a permit therefor. Applications for such permit, describing such work, shall be made in writing and shall conform to the requirements set forth in the Uniform Building Code as to extent of information disclosed. No permit shall be required for the use of approved lamps, lights, appliances, tools, or equipment connected to permanently installed wiring by means of a receptacle or fixture. The fee for electrical permits shall be as set forth in Park City Fee Resolutions.

SECTION VII. Amendments. Section 11-9-1 of the MCPC is hereby amended as follows:

11-9-1. UNIFORM FIRE CODE. The "Uniform Fire Code", 1994 edition ~~1991 edition~~, as adopted by the International Conference of Building Officials and the Western Fire Chiefs Association and printed as codes in book form is hereby adopted as the Fire Code of Park City with the following amendments:

(A) **Removal of debris** All debris created from a fire shall be removed and the property restored to normal condition within ninety (90) days after the fire or as soon as the property is released by the State Fire Marshal, the Park City Building Official, or insurance adjuster, whichever is later. In the event the debris is not cleared, such debris shall be declared a nuisance and removed by the City at the expense of the property owner.

(B) **Administration and Enforcement.** The Building Official shall be responsible for the administration and enforcement of the Fire Code and shall, among other things, enforce all state statutes and local ordinances and/or regulations pertaining to:

- (1) the prevention of fires;
- (2) the suppression or extinguishing of dangerous or hazardous fires;
- (3) the storage, use and handling of explosives flammable, toxic, corrosive, and other hazardous gaseous, solid and liquid materials;
- (4) the installation and maintenance of automatic, manual and other private fire alarm systems and fire extinguishing equipment;
- (5) the maintenance and regulations of fire escapes;
- (6) the maintenance of fire protection and the elimination of fire hazards on land and in buildings, structures, and other property including those under construction;
- (7) the means and adequacy of each exit in the event of fire, from factories, school, hotels, lodging houses, asylums, hospitals, churches, halls, theaters, amphitheaters, and all other places in which people work, live or congregate from time to time for any purposes; and
- (8) the investigation of the cause, origin and circumstances of fire.

(C) **Required Permits.** All applications for permits required by the Fire Code shall be made to the Building Official in such form and detail as he shall prescribe. All applications for permits shall be accompanied by such plans as required by the Building Official and fees paid as per the Fee Resolution.

SECTION VIII. Amendment. Section 11-10-1 of the MCPC is hereby amended as follows:

11-10-1. UNIFORM SIGN CODE. The Uniform Sign Code, 1994 edition ~~1991 edition~~,

as adopted by the International Conference of Building Officials and printed as a code in book form is hereby approved and adopted as the Uniform Sign Code of this City.

SECTION IX. EFFECTIVE DATE. This ordinance shall become effective upon publication.

DESCRIPTION:

A. Topic: Accept City Council disclosure statements in official minute book

B. Background: The policy of Park City, as outlined in Section 3-1-1 of the Municipal Code, is that proper operation of democratic government requires that public officials and employees be independent, impartial and responsible to the people; that government decisions and policy be made in proper channels of the governmental structure; that public office not be used for personal gain; and that the public have confidence in the integrity of its government. In recognition of these goals, a code of ethics for all city officers and employees is adopted.

Part of the ethics code is accomplished by directing written disclosure by such officers and employees of private, financial or other interest in matters affecting the City. Each year, the City Council and all other boards and commissions are asked to fill out an affidavit which outlines all possible conflicts of interest which the member knows of at the time of filing the affidavit. The affidavit can, and should, be amended as other potential conflicts of interest arise or change in any way.

C. Analysis: Title 3 - Ethics of the Municipal Code of Park City requires that conflicts of interest be disclosed to avoid the appearance of bias. Title 3-1-15 of the Municipal Code states that any City officer who has a financial or personal interest in any proposed action before the council or any board or commission shall disclose on the record of the council, board or commission the nature and extent of such interest. Also, any official or employee who has a financial or personal interest in any proposed action of the council or any board or commission and who participates in discussion with or gives an official opinion or recommendation to the council, board or commission shall disclose on the record of the council, board or commission the nature and extent of such interest. Adoption of the Council members' disclosure statements is the first step toward complying with this process.

DESCRIPTION:

A. Topic. Paratransit operation within the Park City service area.

B. Background. Pursuant to the Department of Transportation's regulation implementing the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), public entities who provide fixed route service and receive federal funding are required to prepare and submit a Paratransit Plan Update to the Federal Transit Administration at the beginning of each calendar year.

The department currently provides complimentary paratransit service in conjunction with Senior/Elderly Service. This is a demand/response, door to door type service which operates between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m., Monday thru Friday. We also offer "next day" scheduling for shuttle (ride) requests other than the normal hours of operations such as after 5:00 p.m., Saturdays, Sundays, and holidays.

C. Analysis. Paratransit Plan Updates amend the initial 1992 plan. It is required that all plan updates include information necessary to amend the original requirements, including all significant changes and revisions to the implementation timetable.

The department's 1996 plan update demonstrates that milestones from the initial plan and subsequent updates have been achieved. Although the ridership for disabled passengers is slightly lower than last year, overall ridership for Senior Service is up 4%.

The 1996 Paratransit Plan Update includes:

- * identification of submitting entity
- * progress report on milestones
- * ridership service estimates
- * five (5) year budget
- * public hearing
- * unresolved issues
- * significant changes to original plan

D. Department Review. Public Works and Transportation have reviewed the plan, and with the exception of the public hearing scheduled for January 18, 1996, the above criteria has been met.

SIGNIFICANT IMPACTS: The department currently offers subscription service to two disabled passengers who use wheelchairs. The service provides them with rides to school, clinic, shopping and home. There are no other transportation providers in the Park City area who offer wheelchair accessible service.

CONSEQUENCES OF NOT TAKING THE RECOMMENDED ACTION: The City would lose federal funding for capital purchases if the service is reduced and/or eliminated.

II. PROGRESS REPORT ON MILESTONES

Comparable paratransit services are provided the same days and hours of the fixed route services. For service between 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday same day requests are accommodated. For service other than the above days and hours, next day scheduling for ADA certified individuals is utilized enabling us to provide the paratransit services the same days and hours of fixed routes.

There remain no trip restrictions, capacity constraints, trip purpose, amount of trips or fares. There has been no slippage from the 1992 plan nor subsequent updates.

Time Table for Implementation

November 1992 - Two accessible cutaway vans were received and are being utilized on Silver Lake portion of the fixed route service.

June 1992 - During summer service periods the two accessible vans along with an accessible coach are utilized on fixed route services providing accessible fixed route services every twenty minutes

September 1993 - Seven (7) new wheelchair lift equipped coaches were received.

November 1993 - With the one coach that was already on line, a total of eight wheelchair lift equipped buses provide accessible transportation on all fixed routes.

January 1995 - Placed two additional wheelchair lift equipped coaches into service bringing the total number to ten.

April 1996 - Anticipate delivery of one accessible, CNG engine equipped trolley bus to replace the one currently being used.

Fall 1996 - Anticipate delivery of two new 35' accessible coaches to replace two 1982 Thomas Transitliners.

III. DEMAND ESTIMATES

The demand forecast is enclosed according to the format provided.

IV. An updated five-year budget is enclosed according to the format provided.

V. PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

January 1996 - Local radio station continues to broadcast periodically that paratransit services are available to residents and visitors and the name of the contact person if anyone is interested in receiving the service.

January 1996 - Local newspaper continues to run public service announcements in the Park Record.

January 1996 - Public Hearing at the Marsac Municipal Building, 445 Marsac Avenue, was held by the City Council to approve Park City's Paratransit Plan update and hear comments from interested individuals.

January 1996 - Members of the Chrysalis and National Ability Center were contacted to assure they were still aware of the services available and of the scheduled public hearing.

The number of ADA Paratransit trips were down 18% over last year due to the loss of one weekly subscriber.

Through continued "Outreach" efforts, total paratransit trips increased from 6,636 trips in 1994 to 6,938 in 1995.

VI. UNRESOLVED ISSUES

There were no issues that arose from the 1995 plan; no comments were made at the public hearings nor has this office received any comments.

VII. OTHER ISSUES

There has been no slippage from our 1992 submission, only improvements with a total of thirteen (13) lift equipped buses which are now on line. There have been no changes in the process used to certify persons as eligible for paratransit services, no one has requested certification, therefore, there have been no denials or certification of services.
